RESOLUTION

Whereas, There enters at Broadway and Twentieth Street and flows through the City of Concordia, Kansas, a natural watercourse, the overflow from which in the event of high water is liable to cause injury to Broadway, a public street in said city, and other public property; and, whereas, this governing body of said city deems it necessary that said street and public property be protected from said overflow pursuant to the authority of G. S. 1935, 12-635, et seq., as amended

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved, That it is necessary, and is hereby declared to be necessary, for the public good and convenience, that the said Broadway street be protected from the overflow of said watercourse; that the Consulting Engineering firm of Black and Veatch, Kansas City, Missouri, deemed by the City Commission to be competent engineers, make a survey of said watercourse and said street and file the same with the City Clerk with maps and profiles of the survey and a full and complete plan of protecting said street from the overflow or damage by water of said watercourse and also the physical characteristics and location of Broadway and any right-of-way, roadbed, bridge or bridges, streets and alleys and other property liable to be injured or damaged by the overflow of said watercourse that the said consulting engineers also make an estimate of the cost of the entire work and improvement required to protect said street, showing the several items of the same; and that said consulting engineers make their report thereof in triplicate and file the same with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved, that the engineers' surveys, maps, profiles, plans, specifications, reports and cost estimate on file in the city clerk's office pertaining to the flood protection described in the preamble to this resolution be approved without the spillway structure; that the resolution of this governing body of the city of Concordia, Kansas, adopted July 24, 1950, be and it is rescinded; that said city enter into a contract with Hilary J. Wentz and A. M. Wilcox, partners doing business under the firm name and style of Wentz Construction Company, for the doing of the work called for by the engineers' survey, maps, profiles, plans and specifications on file in the city clerk's office in connection with the flood protection mentioned in the preamble to this resolution, except the construction of the spillway, for \$3,662.00, more or less, based upon unit prices as set out in the contract, and that the mayor is hereby authorized on behalf of the city to execute such contract in duplicate, and the city clerk is hereby authorized to attest and deliver the same under the official seal of his office.

Whereas, Ordinance No. 1322 of the City of Concordia, Kansas which became effective October 19, 1950, authorized the issuance of \$6341.73 temporary notes of said city to pay the cost of improving a portion of Eleventh Street in said city; and, whereas, said notes are to be issued from time to time as the progress of the work requires and when authorized by resolution of the governing body of said city; and, whereas, there has heretofore been authorized and issued under approved estimates and claims duly filed, a temporary note numbered one, in the sum of \$3,385.00; and, whereas, additional costs and expenses in the sum of \$2956.73, according to approved estimates and claims on file, have been incurred; and, whereas, on December 18, 1950, the governing body authorized the issuance of a \$2925.73 temporary note but such note has not been issued; and, whereas, said sum of \$2956.73 and the aggregate of the one previously issued note for said project do not exceed the sum of \$6341.73 as authorized by ordinance numbered 1322 and will not cause to be exceeded any statutory or constitutional bonded debt limit; Now, Therefore,

Be It Resolved, That the resolution adopted December 18, 1950, authorizing the issuance of a temporary note of that date, numbered 2, for \$2925.65, be and it is rescinded; and,

Be It Further Resolved, That a temporary note as authorized by Ordinance No. 1322 be issued in the sum of \$2956.73, be numbered two, and be dated January 2, 1951.

Upon motion by Commissioner Cool and seconded by Commissioner Freeman and carried unanimously, the foregoing resolution was adopted.

Whereas, Ordinance No. 1314 authorized the issuance of \$53,414.00 temporary notes of the City of Concordia, Kansas, to pay the cost of improving Broadway Street in said city; and, whereas, said notes are to be issued from time to time as the progress of the work requires and when authorized by resolution of the governing body of said city; and, whereas, there has heretofore been authorized and issued under approved estimates and claims duly filed a temporary note numbered one in the sum of \$3,872.07 and a temporary note numbered two in the amount of \$16,860.69; and, whereas, additional expenses in the sum of \$28,188.54 according to approved estimates and vouchers on file have been incurred; and, whereas, said sum of \$28,188.54 and the aggregate of all previously issued notes for said project do not exceed the sum of \$53,414.00 as authorized by ordinance No. 1314 and will not cause to be exceeded any statutory or constitutional bonded debt limit, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved, That a temporary note as authorized by Ordinance No. 1314 be issued in the sum of \$28,188.54, be numbered three, and be dated January 2, 1951.

Upon Motion by Commissioner Freeman and seconded by Commissioner Cool and carried unanimously, the foregoing resolution was adopted.

Whereas, Ordinance No. 1313 authorized the issuance of \$14,675.00 temporary notes of the City of Concordia, Kansas, to pay the cost of improving Twelfth and Fourteenth Streets between Cedar and Republican Streets in said city; and, whereas, said notes are to be issued from time to time as the progress of the work requires and when authorized by resolution of the governing body of said city; and, whereas, there has heretofore been authorized and issued under approved estimates and claims duly filed a temporary note numbered one in the sum of \$810.00, and a temporary note numbered two in the amount of \$5,816.31; and, whereas, additional expenses in the sum of \$7440.69 according to approved estimates and vouchers on file, have been incurred; and, whereas, said sum of \$7440.69 and the aggregate of all previously issued notes for said project do not exceed the sum of \$14,675.00 as authorized by ordinance No. 1313 and will not cause to be exceeded any statutory or constitutional bonded debt limit; NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved, That a temporary note as authorized by Ordinance No. 1313 be issued in the sum of \$7440.69, be numbered three, and be dated January 2, 1951.

Upon motion by Commissioner Cool and seconded by Commissioner Freeman and carried unanimously the foregoing resolution was adopted.

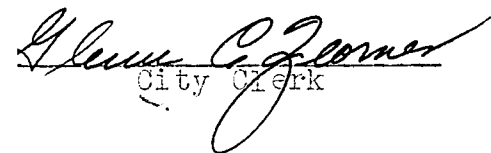
