Now you have asked for an additional 1 mill levy.

Gentlemen, that is a very serious request. One little Mill. We don't carry them around in our pocket and you could not buy anything with them; so they must not have much value; but don't be mislead by that

To every \$1,000.00 valuation that little Mill amounts to \$1.00. To every \$20,000 valuation it is a \$20.00 bill. Still any of us have one of them at sometime or another. But you take that \$20.00 bill and you put it on top of 85 more \$20.00 bills and that is where this becomes serious.

Actually no board or public official has the right to spend tax payers money unless a real need exists.

I think we should list some of the present public and private facilities open for Recreation.

A swimming pool; bowling alley; our National Guard Armory; six parks with playgrounds and play ground equipment; 6 gymnasiums; 6 lighted ball parks; Tennis courts; Indoor swimming pool; Race track; Picnic Grounds; Scout camp and Scout Houses; Theater; Drive-in Theater; and 4 completed lakes within 50 miles.

A Pizza Parlor; 3 drug stores; Many Recreation Parlors and Dance Halls.

And for the Senior Citizen who has nothing to do and no place to go We have Social Security; Welfare; Sunset Home; St. Ann's Home; The New Nurses Home; also a new Nurses home being built on East 7th Street.

We have Martin Manor; Hansen's Rest Home; Parkview Rest Home; 3 Pool Halls; a Bowling Alley; The Elks Club; Moose Club; Vets Club; Legion Club, Knights of Columbus Club, etc.

Golf Grounds, fine fishing and hunting near town.

We have bridge Clubs; Service Clubs; Sewing Groups, Study Clubs, Civic Clubs,

14 Churches with Church Groups and Fellowship Halls willing to help young and old.

There is also riding and driving an automobile; Listen to the Home Radio Station; Watch Television; Go to the Library and if there is anytime left many could, like Harry Truman, take a walk. That's free.

Right now we are preparing to build our Junior College.

We must also build roads, sewer lines, water lines, fire plugs, etc., and we don't know for sure just how many more Mills all this is going to require.

I believe you are aware that many of the facilities I spoke of are private enterprises employing many people, some of them with payrolls of nearly \$100,000.00 per year.

Many of the facilities listed are owned and maintained by the Taxpayers at a very large cost.

Now finally to the Recreation Commission; The Jaycees; The Chamber of Commerce and to all the fine women and men who have given their time or have even been willing to do whatever they could to help this program along. The city manager presented these plans to the Commission for their consideration. The plans include land area north of East 7th Street and East of Doster. The outfall sewer would go north from the Nor'East Industrial Park area to the sewerage treatment plant. After a lengthy discussion the Commission expressed a desire to study the plan furthur, no conclusions were made at this time.

#### SICK LEAVE - SECTION VII.

All officers and employees of regular standing are eligible for sick leave in accordance with the following schedule.

During first year of regular employment	10 calendar days
During second year	14 calendar days
During third year and over	21 calendar days
During fifth year and over	30 cälendar days
During tenth year and over	60 calendar days

Such leave will be granted upon satisfactory evidence of illness given to the City Manager. The number of days of sick leave do not accumulate from year to year. The first year of regular employment begins on the date the employee has completed his probationary period of employment and starts receiving a regular monthly salary. No sick leave is provided for part-time or seasonal employment.

# VACATIONS

All officers and employees of regular standing are eligible for annual vacations in accordance with the following schedule:

After 1st year of employment 7 calendar days
After 2nd year and over 14 calendar days

During the first year of regular employment vacation time accumulates at the rate of .01918 days per day of employment. This will amount to 7 days after 365 days of employment. This 7-day vacation can be taken during the second year of employment. Should an employee resign, be laid off, or for any reason be severed from employment with the city, the number of days the employee worked from the time he attained regular status is multiplied times .01918 to determine how many days vacation he had earned up to the time of his leaving the city. The accumulated vacation earned by an employee is to be paid to him upon his leaving the city employment regardless of the reason for his leaving the city. The following formula will be used to determine wages the employee will receive for accrued vacation time when employment is severed with the city. Annual salary divided by 365- calendar day salary multiplied by vacation days accrued. During the second year of employment, the multiplying factor is .03836 so that at the end of two years employment, 14 days of vacation has been earned and may be taken during the 3rd year of employment. Vacations will not accumulate from year to year. If an employee does not take his vacation during the year in which it is supposed to be taken he has lost this benefit.

No vacation time is provided for part-time or seasonal employees. The time which an employee desires to take for his vacation must meet with the approval of his department head and the City Manager.

# HOLIDAYS - SECTION VIII.

All departments, with the exception of the Fire and Police Departments, shall receive the following holidays during the year:

New Years Day Memorial Day Independence Day Labor Day Veterans Day Thanksgiving Day Christmas Day Should any one of these days fall upon a Sunday, the following day, Monday, will be observed as a holiday. No seasonal or part-time employee, or a new employee who is in the probationary period shall receive holiday benefits; however, should it be necessary for him to work on the holiday, he shall receive his regular hourly wage.

# ADVANCEMENT IN CLASSIFICATION - SECTION IX

Any advancement in classification must have the approval of the City Manager. No employee is eligible for advancement until the minimum time specified at his present classification has been completed. If no time is specified, advancement shall be at the discretion of the City Manager, but in no event shall exceed the maximum pay for the classification as contained in the current salary resolution.

# SUBSISTENCE AND TRAVEL EXPENSE - SECTION X

When authorized by the city manager, officers and employees of the city shall be reimbursed at the following rate for expenses incurred while on official duty outside the city limits:

Mileage, 7¢ per mile.

Actual costs of meals, lodging, gratuities, registrations and enrollment fees.

# OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES TO RECEIVE ONLY ONE SALARY - XI

A person holding more than one office or position of employment in the city government at the same time may receive the salary or compensation of only one office or position of employment, although salaries or other compensation may be authorized for more than one of such offices or positions. Such person shall be paid the larger or largest salary or compensation provided for any such offices or positions: and if two or more salaries or amounts of compensation for any such office or position are equal, the city manager shall determine which shall be paid such person.

# MONEY WHICH IS NOT TO BE CONSIDERED COMPENSATION - XII

All fees, fines, penalties, costs, forfeitures, and other money, except rewards, received by an officer or employee in the exercise of his official duties, shall belong to the city, and in no case are to be considered as compensation by an officer or employee, unless otherwise specifically provided by an ordinance; provided, however, the city clerk may keep all compensation received by him as local registrar of vital statistics.

# COMPENSATION OF ACTING OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES - XIII

If a person holding office or position of employment at the same time acts in the capacity of another office or employee, he shall not receive any salary or other compensation which may be provided for the officer or employee for whom he is acting, but shall continue to receive the salary or compensation which is provided for the office or position which he regularly held.

# CHANGES, ALTERATIONS AND VARIATIONS BY CITY MANAGER - XIV

The City Manager in administering the affairs of the city may make exceptions or variations in the above personnel rules and regulations in those situations he feels warrant an exception or special attention. The number of men and hours of work shall in each department, be determined by the City Manager so as to be within the scope of the current year's budget.

#### WATER WELL REPORT

Mr. Robert Vincent, of Layne-Western Company was present to discuss with the Commissioners the results of seven test holes recently completed in an area northeast of Concordia.

Mr. Vincent noted that a good quantity of water was located at nearly all locations tested, but the quality of the water was satisfactory only at the test hole located 2,700 feet north of the intersection of First and Valley Streets. This location was the furtherest north of all test holes. In a brochure that he presented, Mr. Vincent showed the hardness, the iron content and chloride content at each test site. After a lengthy discussion, the Commission instructed Mr. Vincent to drill two or three more test holes further north before installation of a new well.

### PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL PARKING
