RESOLUTION APPROVING APPLICATION FOR PRELIMINARY LOAN FOR LOW-RENT PUBLIC HOUSING

The following resolution approving application for preliminary loan for low-rent public housing was presented to the City Commission:

RESOLUTION APPROVING APPLICATION FOR PRELIMINARY LOAN FOR LOW-RENT PUBLIC HOUSING

WHEREAS, the City of Concordia, Kansas, acting through the Housing Authority of the City of Concordia, Kansas, is applying to the Housing Assistance Administration, Department of Housing is applying to the Housing Assistance Administration, Department of Housing and Urban Development, in accordance with the provisions of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for a Preliminary Loan in the amount of \$30,000.00 to cover the costs of surveys and planning in connection with low-rent housing projects not to exceed 75 dwelling units of low-rent public housing; and

WHEREAS, it is the policy of this locality to eliminate substandard and other inadequate housing, to prevent the spread of slums and blight, and to realize as soon as feasible the goal of a decent home in a suitable living environment for all of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, under provisions of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the Department of Housing and Urban Development is authorized to provide financial assistance to local public housing agencies for undertaking and carrying out preliminary planning of low-rent housing projects that will assist in meeting this goal; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that there shall be local determination of need for low-rent housing to meet needs not being adequately met by private enterprise, and that the Department of Housing and Urban Development shall not make any contract with a public housing agency for preliminary loans in respect to any low+rent housing project unless the governing body of the locality involved has by resolution approved the application of the public housing agency for such preliminary loan.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Concordia, Kansas:

1. There exists in the City of Concordia, Kansas, a need for such low-rent housing at rents within the means of low-income families;

2. The application of the Housing Authority of the City of Concordia, Kansas, for a preliminary loan in an amount not to exceed \$30,000.00 for surveys and planning in connection with low-rent housing projects of not to exceed 75 dwelling units is hereby approved.

On a motion by Commissioner Cousins, seconded by Commissioner Swiercinsky and duly carried, the said resolution was adopted.

The following resolution providing for cooperation in development and operation of lowrent housing projects was presented to the City Commission:

> A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR COOPERATION IN DEVELOPMENT AND OPERATION OF LOW-RENT HOUSING PROJECTS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF CONCORDIA, KANSAS:

Section 1. Whenever used in this Resolution:

(a) The Term "Municipality" and the term "Local Authority shall mean respectively, the City of Concordia, Kansas and the Housing Authority of the City of Concordia, Kansas.

(b) The term "Project" shall mean any low-rent housing hereafter developed as an entity by the Municipality acting by and through the Local Authority with financial assistance of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA (herein called the "Government"); excluding, however, any low-rent housing project covered by any contract for loans and annual contributions entered into between the Local Authority and the Government or its predecessor agencies prior to the date of this Agreement. MINUTES OF THE REGULAR COMMISSION MEETING HELD ON MAY 5, 1971 (CONTINUED)

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(c) The term "Taxing Body" shall mean the State or any political subdivision or taxing unit thereof in which a Project is situated and which would have authority to assess or levy real or personal property taxes or to certify such taxes to a taxing body or public officer to be levied for its use and benefit with respect to a Project if it were not exempt from taxation.

(d) The term "Shelter Rent" shall mean the total of all charges to all tenants of a Project for dwelling rents and nondwelling rents (excluding all other income of such Project), less the cost to the Local Authority of all dwelling and nondwelling utilities.

(e) The term "Slum" shall mean any other where dwellings predominate which, by reason of dilapidation, overcrowding, faulty arrangement or design, lack of ventilation, light or sanitation facilities, or any combination of these factors, are detrimental to safety, health, or morals.

Section 2. The Municipality acting through the Local Authority shall endeavor (a) to secure a contract or contracts with the Government for loans and annual contributions covering one or more Projects comprising approximately 75 units of low-rent housing and (b) to develop and administer such Project or Projects, each of which shall be located within the corporate limits of the Municipality. It is hereby determined that all of said low-rent housing units are necessary to house eligible low income families under the Kansas Municipal Housing Law. The provisions of this Resolution shall apply to each such Project.

Section 3. (a) Under the constitution and statutes of the State of Kansas, all Projects are exempt from all real and personal property taxes and special assessments levied or imposed by any taxing body. With respect to any Project, so long as either (i) such Project is owned by a public body or governmental agency and is used for low-rent housing purposes, or (ii) any contract between the Municipality or the Local Authority and the Government for loans or annual contributions, or both, in connection with such Project remains in force and effect, or (iii) any bonds issued in connection with such Project or any monies due to the Government in connection with such Project remain unpaid, whichever period is the longest, the Municipality agrees that it will not levy or impose any real or personal property taxes or special assessments upon such Project or upon the Local Authority with respect thereto. During such period, the Local Authority shall make annual payments (herein called "Payments in Lieu of Taxes") in lieu of such taxes and special assessments and in payment for the public services and facilities furnished from time to time without other cost or charge for or with respect to such Project.

(b) Each such annual Payment in Lieu of Taxes shall be made after the end of the fiscal year established for such Project, and shall be in an amount equal to either (i) ten percent (10%) of the aggregate Shelter Rent actually collected but in no event to exceed ten percent (10%) of the Shelter Rent charged by the Local Authority in respect to such Project during such fiscal year, or (ii) the amount permitted to be paid by applicable state law in effect on the date such payment is made, whichever amount is the lower.

(c) The Municipality shall distribute the Payments in Lieu of Taxes among the Taxing Bodies in the proportion which the real property taxes which would have been paid to each Taxing Body for such year if the Project were not exempt from taxation bears to the toal real property taxes which would have been paid to all of the Taxing Bodies for such year if the Project were not exempt from taxation; <u>Provided</u>, however, that no payment for any year shall be made to any Taxing Body in excess of the amount of the real property taxes which would have been paid to such Taxing Body for such year if the Project were not exempt from taxating.

(d) Upon failure of the Local Authority to make any Payment in Lieu of Taxes, no lien against any Project or assets of the Local Authority shall attach, nor shall any interest or penalties accrue or attach on account thereof.

Section 4. The Municipality agrees that, subsequent to the date of initiation (as defined in the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended) of each Project and within five years after the completion thereof, or such further period as may be approved by the Government, there has been or will be elimination (as approved by the Government)by demolition, condemnation, effective closing, or compulsory repair or improvement, of unsafe or insanitary dwelling units situated in the locality or metropolitan area in which such Project is located, substantially equal in number to the number of newly constructed dwelling units provided by such Project; <u>Provided</u>, that, where more than one family is living in an unsafe or insanitary dwelling unit, the elimination of such unit shall count as the elimination the elimination of such unit shall count as the elimination of units equal to the number of families accommodated therein; and <u>Provided</u>, further, that this paragraph 4 shall not apply in the case of (i) any Project developed on the site of a Slum cleared subsequent to July 15, 1949, and that the dwelling units eliminated by the clearance of the site of Section 5. During the period commencing with the date of the acquisition of any part of the site or sites of any Project and continuing so long as either (i) such Project is owned by a public body or governmental agency and is used for low-rent housing purposes, or (ii) any contract between Municipality or the Local Authority and the Government for loans or annual contributions, or both, in connection with such Project remains in force and effect, or (iii) any bonds issued in connection with such Project or any monies due to the Government in connection with such Project remain unpaid, whichever period is the longest, the Municipality without cost or charge to the Local Authority or the tenants of such Project (other than the Payments in Lieu of Taxes) shall:

(a) Furnish or cause to be furnished to the Local Authority and the tenants of such Project public services and facilities of the same character and to the same extent as are furnished from time to time without cost or charge to other dwellings and inhabitants in the Municipality;

(b) Vacate such streets, roads, and alleys within the area of such Project as may be necessary in the development thereof, and convey without charge to the Local Authority such interest as the Municipality may have in such vacated areas, and, insofar as it is lawfully able to do so without cost or expense to the Local Authority or to the Municipality, cause to be removed from such vacated areas, insofar as it may be necessary, all public or private utility lines and equipment;

(c) Insofar as the Municipality may lawfully do so (i) grant such deviations from the building code of the Municipality as are reasonable and necessary to promote economy and efficiency in the development and administration of such Project, and at the same time safeguard health and safety, and (ii) make such changes in any zoning of the site and surrounding territory of such Project as are reasonable and necessary for the development and protection of such Project and the surrounding territory;

(d) Accept grants of easements necessary for the development of such Project; and

(e) Cooperate with the Local Authority by such other lawful action or ways as the Municipality and the Local Authority may find necessary in connection with the development and administration of such Project.

Section 6. In respect to any Project the Municipality further agrees that within a reasonable time after receipt of a written request therefor from the Local Authority:

(a) It will accept the dedication of all interior streets, roads, alleys, and adjacent sidewalks within the area of such Project, together with all storm and sanitary sewer mains in such dedicated areas, after the Local Authority, at its own expense, has completed the grading, improvement, paving, and installation thereof in accordance with specifications acceptable to the Municipality;

(b) It will accept necessary dedications of land for, and will grade, improve, pave, and provide sidewalks for, all streets bounding such Project or necessary to provide adequate access thereto (in consideration whereof the Local Authority shall pay to the Municipality such amount as would be assessed against the Project site for such work if such site were privately owned); and

(c) It will provide, or cause to be provided, water mains, and storm and sanitary sewer mains, leading to such Project and serving the bounding streets thereof (in consideration whereof the Local Authority shall pay to the Municipality such amount as would be assessed against the Project site for such work if such site were privately owned):

Section 7. If by reason of the Municipality's failure or refusal to furnish or cause to be furnished any public services or facilities which it has agreed hereunder to furnish or to cause to be furnished to the Local Authority or to the tenants of any Project, the Local Authority incurs any expense to obtain such services or facilities then the Local Authority may deduct the amount of such expense from any Payments in Lieu of Taxes due or to become due to the Municipality in respect to any Project or any other low-rent housing projects owned by the Local Authority.

Section 8. No Cooperation Resolution heretofore passed by the Municipality shall be construed to apply to any Project covered by this Resolution.

Section 9. So long as any contract between the Municipality and the Government for loans (including preliminary loans) or annual contributions, or both, in connection with any Project remains in force and effect, or so long as any bonds issued in connection with any Project, or any monies due to the Government in connection with any Project remain unpaid, this Resolution shall not be repealed, modified or amended without the consent of the Government. The privileges and obligations of the Municipality hereunder shall remain in full force and effect with respect to each Project so long as the beneficial title to such Project

The mayor announced that one of the purposes of this meeting was to consider the proposed assessments, as set out in the assessment roll prepared by the city manager and on file in the office of the city clerk, for the following improvement: the grading and surfacing of the alley in Block 81 in the City of Concordia, which is within the corporate limits of the city of Concordia, Kansas, as authorized by a resolution of this governing body adopted May 19, 1971, and to hear written or oral objections thereto. The governing body determined that notice of the hearing had been published and that notice of the hearing and a statement of the costs proposed to be assessed had been mailed to the owners of the property made liable to pay such assessments, all as provided by Section 9(b) of Chapter 99, of the Kansas legislative session laws of 1957, otherwise cited as K.S.A. 12-6a09(b).

Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Letourneau, property owners, were present with no objections.

Tuggle: Captain, do you recall the time your wife came to get you? Witness: It was after 11 - near 11:30. Tuggle: She had come to get you? Witness: yes. Tuggle: Captain, do you recall when your wife received the phone call from Linda? Witness: It was around 11. About 5 to 10 minutes after 11. Tuggle: Do you recall what time they left? Witness: Immediately. Tuggle: No further questions.

Mayor: I have one question. Did you ever get down to the Lounge? Witness: Not inside. Tuggle: That is all the evidence we have to present at this time.

Mr. Stanford alleges violation of city. Said Mrs. Davidson was on notice as to the selling of beer, not the drinking of beer. Tuggle: The license on _____ notice is relevant to the drinking as well as

buying.

Stanford: I want my witnesses sworn. Buechel: There is no authority to swear in witnesses at a hearing of this type. I know of no statutory authority... Stanford: There have been no sworn witnesses up to this time. Stanford: State your name. Witness: Viola Davidson. Stanford: Are you the owner and operator of the Broadway Lounge? Witness: Broadway, yes. Stanford: Were you present on March 14, 1971? Witness: I was. Stanford: I'll ask you specifically, did you see Linda Murdock consume any beer on that night?

Witness: Not that night.

Stanford: Did you bring her to my office today?

Witness: Yes. She said she drank beer in the car but not in my place. She and another girl were drinking beer and cherry vodka. She left at ll o'clock. She was going to Cooleys to borrow \$2.00 from her mother. (something about serving Larry) ... I served them 2 beers and 1 Pepsi and Larry paid for it. I did not sell to Linda. She sat at a dirty booth. I had been sick and didn't get all the booths clean. Whether she drank from the glass that was there, I don't know. I didn't see Linda consume any beer. Before my help is to serve beer, they are instructed to check all ID cards and not to sell to anyone under 18 - those are my rules.

Stanford: Have any police officers been in your establishment?

Witness: Yes. Liedtke, Sterling and Bogart came in quite a lot.

Stanford: Mr. Liedtke had been in and so had Sterling?

Witness: I asked Mr. Liedtke if he had seen anything wrong with the way I ran my place, and he said he hadn't seen anything wrong.

Tuggle: I object. This is hearsay.

Stanford: You could bring Officer Liedtke and question him. Mayor: Please leave out the hearsay.... Stanford: She has inquired of the officers....(____) None of the officers object to the conditions at the Lounge. Mrs. Davidson always has taken reasonable precautions.) None of the officers object Mrs. Davidson, have you ever sold beer to anyone under 18? Witness: Not to my knowledge. Stanford: You were the one to serve 2 beers? Witness: Can't serve you beer now. It's nearly closing time. They said if I'd serve them the beer they'd drink it fast. Stanford: What time was this? Witness: 10 minutes to 12. Stanford: Larry Murdock paid you? Witness: Yes. Stanford: Your witness. Tuggle: Is it true Mrs. Davidson, you stated you did not sell beer to Linda Murdock? Witness: I did not. Not to my knowledge. Stanford: Has she ever consumed beer? Witness: Not to my knowledge. Tuggle: Do you have quite a few employees? Witness: Two. When I have a dance band, I pay \$5.00 to one employee to check the kid's ID's and about drinking. Tuggle:() Mayor: Did I understand this? Linda left the Lounge to go to Cooley's and she didn't come back until 12. Witness: She sat in booth. I served them 2 beers and a Pepsi. It came to 85¢. Cart: No questions. Stanford: State your name and address. Witness: William Smith, Belleville, Kansas. Stanford: Have you worked for Viola Davidson? Witness: Between January of 70 to May 70. Stanford: During that time did she ever instruct you on selling beer to minors? Witness: Yes. She said do not sell beer, and check all ID's. Tuggle: I object. It is not relevant. Stanford: It shows the practice that beer is either sold or consumed by minors. Tuggle: Habit or practice is not admissable. Stanford: Yes it is. Mayor: We would like to hold the evidence to March 14th, if we could. Stanford: Felt it was material to show how she instructed her employees. Tuggle: It is not relevant. Mayor: One more question. Did you ever serve beer to anyone under 18? Witness: Not knowingly. Stanford: State your name. Witness: Thomas L. Anderson. Stanford: Are you employed by Co-op? Witness: Yes. Stanford: Do you frequent the place in question? Witness: Every evening. Stanford: Did you ever see a minor served beer there? Tuggle: Objection. The question is completely irrelevant. No proof here. March 14th is the issue. The issue is March 14th and Linda Murdock. Stanford: Were you there March 14th? Witness: Yes. Stanford: Did you see Linda Murdock? Witness: Not while I was there. Stanford: Did you see any minors served beer? Witness: No. Stanford: What time were you there? Witness: From 5 to 8:30. Tuggle: Linda could have been there at ll p.m.? Witness: Yeah, after I left. Stanford: That's all. Except that we could assume a gross violation. Had there been gross violations going on here, police would have been called in. I do not believe that any gross violation has been proven, it has been controverted, true. Believe who you want, but in all fairness to Viola Davidson, she has a lot at stake here. Her testimony is more plausible as she has a great deal to lose. The only person who could establish a violation

be assured the place will be policed. She has bands, she pays them \$5.00 to check ID's, she has assumed reasonable precaution. As for the record, it is the first time (_______). We could appeal, but she would have no relief until heard by the District Court. She would lose her business and be forced to sell. On the evidence presented it would be neither just or fair to take our license at this time. We ask for your indulgence and consideration and assume this procedure be resolved in her favor. First of all, we ask that the Commission talk to Officer Liedtke. We urge the Commission to talk to them.

Tuggle: Before a hearing of this type is brought before the Commission there are many infractions. The Commission should consider this. All the evidence is that Linda Murdock drank beer on March 14, 1971. The girl was under age and no ID check was made on her. We feel that this is (______) before a complaint is ever brought to the Commission (_______)...there are many prior infractions. One last point. As a note of law. We are merely seeking a revocation of license. This is not a criminal nature. We did show that this infraction did occur. The Commission should talk to the Police Department and you will probably get an earful.

This is the first hearing. We feel we should not establish a precedence. That word will get around that the other establishments could sell beer to minors knowing they would only be given a warning. I feel it would be a poor precedent. It would be demoralizing to the police. Word would get around that the Commission does nothing and they would go ahead and sell beer to minors.

Mayor: You both have suggested that we visit with the police. We would like time to study the evidence and discuss this. You will receive written notice of our decision.
