Background on proposed Wildlife Ordinance for the City of Langley

Wildlife is an important part of the natural setting that defines the City of Langley's identity. On July 3, 2023, the Council authorized a task force to explore the possibility of enacting an ordinance to manage conflicts that arise between people and wildlife in our city.

The proposed ordinance can be summarized as "no harm, no feed": people may not trap, poison, or otherwise harm wildlife unless the animals pose an imminent threat to safety or property other than residential landscaping, and may not feed or otherwise attract wildlife except birds.

This effort grew out of work by the Highlands at Langley which adopted a similar "no harm, no feed" rule on June 21, 2023. The Highlands rule was motivated by "Langley bunnies", which at the time were abundant in our neighborhood and elsewhere in the City.

As we worked to extend the rule to the City, we learned that different wildlife issues are paramount in other neighborhoods, notably excessive feeding of deer. We also recognized the legitimate interests of homeowners, businesses, and farmers to protect property and crops.

The proposed ordinance seeks to accommodate these interests appropriately while at the same time reflecting the importance of wildlife to the Langley way of life.

CHAPTER xxxx WILDLIFE

Definitions

For purposes of this chapter, the terms "wild animal" and "wildlife" are used interchangeably to mean non-human mammals and birds that live in a wild state and are not controlled by humans. This includes feral domestic animals.

Harming of wildlife restricted

It is unlawful to kill or harm wild animals. It is unlawful to trap, set traps or other devices, poison, or place poison with intent to kill or harm, except under the following conditions.

- 1. The animal poses an imminent threat to human safety or the safety of animals under human control including livestock and pets;
- 2. The animal poses an imminent threat to commercial crops or other commercial farming activities;
- 3. The animal poses an imminent threat to personal or real property except residential landscaping.

Feeding of wildlife restricted

It is unlawful to feed or otherwise attract wild animals except birds. Under extreme environmental conditions in which the animals are facing starvation or severe deprivation, it is acceptable to facilitate natural foraging, for example clearing snow or ice to expose vegetation.

Exceptions

- A. This chapter does not apply to an animal control officer, veterinarian, peace officer, town employee, federal or state wildlife official, certified pest control employee, or property owner who is authorized by a local, state, or federal government to treat, manage, capture, trap, hunt or remove wild animals and who is acting within the scope of the person's authority.
- B. Nothing in this chapter shall limit protection of endangered, protected, or other classified wildlife per WAC 220-440-060 or permit use of control measures (including traps and poisons) prohibited under state law RCW 77.15.194, RCW 77.15.196, RCW 77.36.030 and other applicable laws and regulations.

Violation – Penalty

Violation of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to a civil penalty as set forth in Chapter 1.14. When violations are of a

continuing nature, the penalty shall increase each day of the violation as set forth in Section 1.14.050(E). (Ord. 1055 \S 1, 2019; Ord. 1053 \S 1, 2019; Ord. 832, 2003; Ord. 430, 1984)

Pursuant to the initial hearing on October 30, 2023 in compliance with RCW 35A.33.070, the updated budget is hereby presented for your consideration. The 2024 ad valorem tax levy was approved by Council November 6 (Resolution #838) and thereafter accepted with the 2024 bond levy by the Board of Island County Commissioners and Island County Assessor's Office on November 21 in accordance with RCW 35A.33.135, RCW 84.52.020, and RCW 84.52.025.

Revisions were made after the initial hearing and balances thereby adjusted. To the best of my knowledge, the estimates of revenues and expenditures are accurate and the document presented is compliant with Washington State statutes. RCW 35A.33.075 requires that totals of estimated revenues and appropriations for each separate fund and the aggregate totals for all such funds combined be set forth in summary form.

RCW 35A.33.075 requires that the final budget as adopted be transmitted to the state auditor, and to the association of Washington cities.

DRAFT ORDINANCE NO. 1113

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF LANGLEY, WASHINGTON, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2024.

WHEREAS, the City of Langley, Washington completed and placed on file with the City Clerk a proposed budget and estimate of the amount of moneys required to meet the public expenses, bond retirement and interest, reserve funds, and expenses of government of the City for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2024; and

WHEREAS, a notice was published that the City Council would meet on December 18, 2023 at 5:30 p.m., in the council chambers of city hall for the purpose of making and adopting a budget for said fiscal year and giving taxpayers within the limits of the City an opportunity to be heard in a public hearing upon said budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council did hold a public hearing at that time and place and did then consider the matter of the proposed budget for the fiscal year 2024; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget does not exceed the lawful limit of taxation allowed by law to be levied on the property within the City for the purposes set forth in the budget, and the estimated expenditures set forth in the budget being all necessary to carry on the government of the City for the fiscal year 2024 and being sufficient to meet the various needs of the City during that period;

NOW THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Langley Washington, does ordain as follows:1

SECTION 1. The budget for the City of Langley, Washington for the year 20<u>24</u> is hereby adopted at the fund level in its final form and content as set forth in the comprehensive budget document, City of Langley 2024 Budget, copies of which are on file in the Office of the City Clerk.

SECTION 2. Estimated resources, including fund balances for each separate fund of the City of Langley Washington, for the year 2024 are set forth in summary form below, and are hereby appropriated for expenditure at the fund level during the year 2024 as set forth in the City of Langley 2024 Budget

Staff Report

Repeated from December 4 – initial budget hearing for tonight's second hearing:

Pursuant to the initial hearing on October 30, 2023 in compliance with RCW 35A.33.070, the updated budget is hereby presented for your consideration. The 2024 ad valorem tax levy was approved by Council November 6 (Resolution #838) and thereafter accepted with the 2024 bond levy by the Board of Island County Commissioners and Island County Assessor's Office on November 21 in accordance with RCW 35A.33.135, RCW 84.52.020, and RCW 84.52.025.

Revisions were made after the initial hearing and balances thereby adjusted. To the best of my knowledge, the estimates of revenues and expenditures are accurate and the document presented is compliant with Washington State statutes. RCW 35A.33.075 requires that totals of estimated revenues and appropriations for each separate fund and the aggregate totals for all such funds combined be set forth in summary form.

RCW 35A.33.075 requires that the final budget as adopted be transmitted to the state auditor, and to the association of Washington cities.

Work Plan Progress:

- Budget figures have been analyzed further and cash flow analysis has been undertaken.
 Alternatives to handle a possible general fund cash shortage in February and March have been identified.
- Possible savings measures are being discussed and if enacted by the end of the first Quarter of 2024's activities to reflect changes, a budget amendment will be prepared.
- November draft financials were issued to the Finance & Personnel Legislative Committee (FPLC) and staff, which will help better estimate year-end fund balances.
- Accounting Clerk Allison Gubata and I took a State Auditor's Office CASH BARS Manual training webinar on November 16 to learn of changes to the manual effective January 1, 2023, and the basics of annual report filing.

- I met with the State Auditor's Office via Teams to meet the members of the audit team and discuss the schedule for the audit, as well as to identify their areas of audit concentration and risk assessments. The 2021-2022 audit will start around January 8, 2024.
- We had three responses to the RFP for Financial Management Software replacement and have identified the two systems that best fit the City's needs. Demonstrations are scheduled for December 13 and January 4. Regarding the City's ability to pay for new financial/accounting software, I am preparing analyses to propose various financing options.
- I published a legal notice of an RFP for Arbitrage Compliance Services in connection with the 2020 issue of the Langley Infrastructure Project (LIP) Bonds. The deadline for responses to be submitted is December 22 and I am already receiving submissions. A choice of consultant will be made, and the contract brought before Council in early January.
- The Langley Chamber lease is due for renewal January 1, 2024; an appropriate increase was
 proposed and the lease was delivered to the Chamber at the beginning of December. I
 understand it was approved at the December 11 Council meeting.
- The Island County Prosecuting Attorney's Office has notified the City of an increase of 3.5% for handling prosecution services for 2024 as per its agreement and is asking to have discussions in 2024 about renewing the interlocal agreement effective in 2025.
