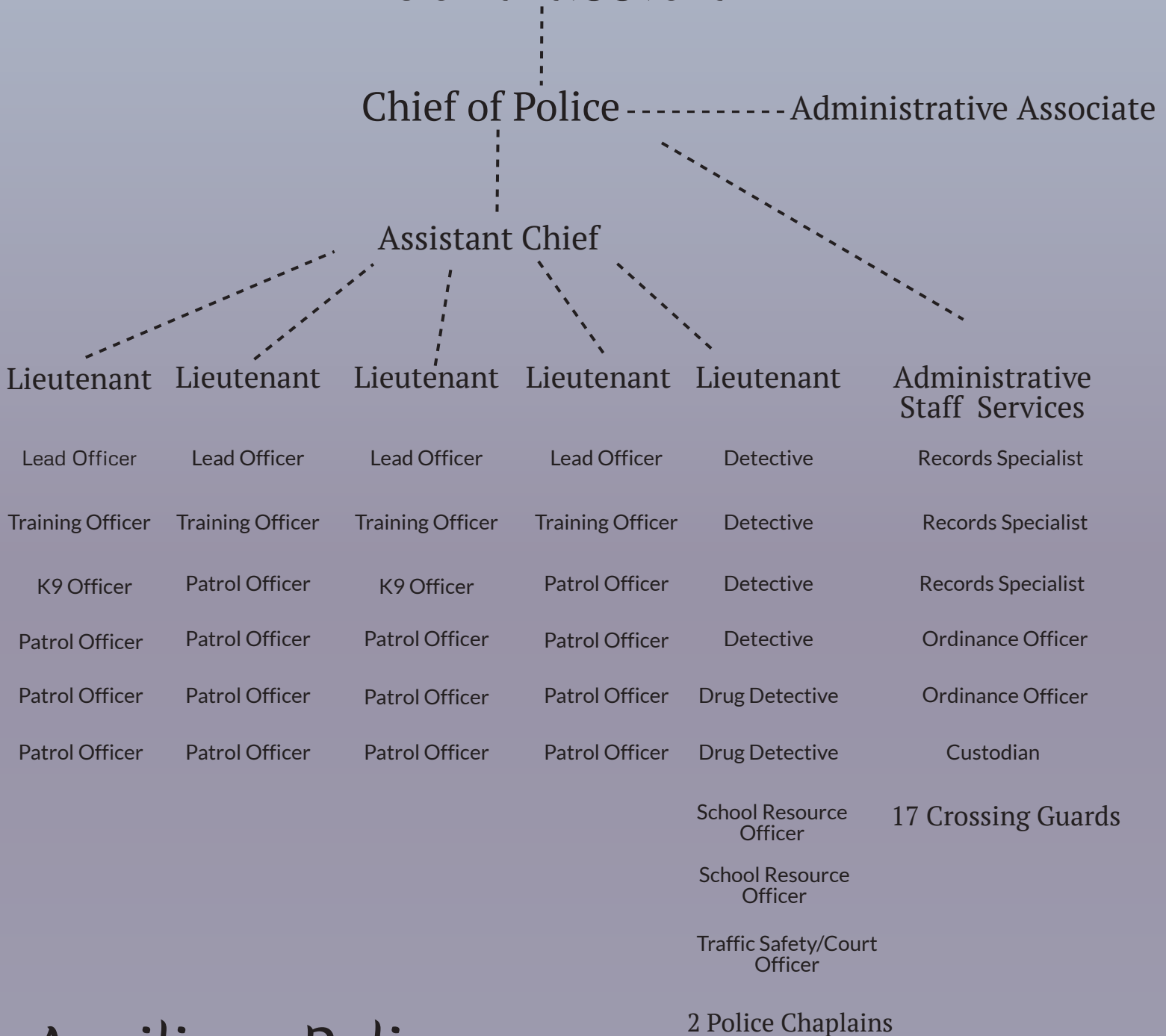

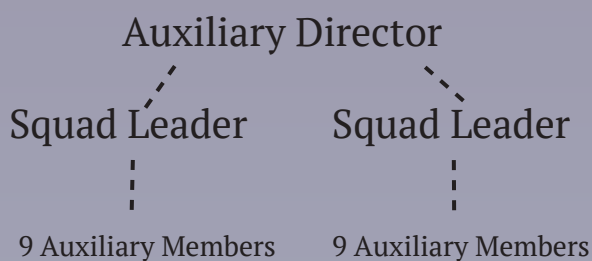


Police Organizational Chart

In 2019 the Marshfield Police Department Honors Committee developed policy and criteria to add more awards to recognize officers, employees and community partners. Recipients were recognized at the Marshfield Police Department's 2nd Annual Awards Ceremony held at the Marshfield Police Department on April 29 and 30, 2021.

Lt. Jason Punke was selected as **Officer of the Year**. This award recognizes achievement by an officer for performing above and beyond the officer's basic assignment. Lt. Punke received this award after receiving several nominations making this year's award even more prestigious.

This award recognizes a non-sworn police department member for performing above and beyond their basic assignment. Don Gleisner was selected as our **Member of the Year**. Don also received several nominations. He is consistent and timely in his response to transport calls and also serves our community and helps the department as an adult crossing guard.



The **Career Achievement Award** recognizes members of the department who have retired in good standing.

Lead Officer Steven Meek was hired as a Marshfield patrol officer on January 2, 1991 and served the department and community in a large number of capacities in the almost 30 years he worked for the city. Steve retired on November 4, 2020.

COMMUNITY AWARDS

The **Community Partnership Award** was presented to *Scotty's Pizza & Chicken* based on their outward support of our department events and during emergency incidents. Scotty donated pizzas for Shop with a Cop in 2019, supported us and another local business by bringing 2 1/2 Cups cupcakes early in the Covid pandemic, offered to provide food during the extensive search for a lost elderly woman in July and has given our department pizza coupons to give to those in need. Scotty and his family do not only do this for our department, but for other agencies and organizations in the community as well. They are true community members!



The **Media Relations Award** recognizes a local media person or organization that actively engages with the department and reports objectively, which helps strengthen public trust in the department. The Media Relations Award was presented to *Breanna Butler* of OnFocus. Breanna consistently reaches out to celebrate officer milestones and share their stories with the community. She does so in a manner which respects the officer's natural reluctance. Breanna also grabs hold of the positive or quirky stories we post to Facebook and works to amplify them with the reach of her audience.



The **Agency Assist Award** recognizes a professional person, group or agency that has provided aid to the department in the service of our community. The committee presented this award to the *Marshfield Medical Center Emergency Room Staff*. One of the nominations summed it up perfectly by stating "Despite the fact that we usually bring them the worst clientele, they try to go above and beyond to make our life a bit easier."



The **Community Member Commendable Action Award** was sent to *Kim and Joe Maney* and rescue K9 Reba for their response from Three Lakes to voluntarily search for a missing elderly dementia patient. They did not request any compensation or seek publicity for their efforts. K9 Reba tracked the missing woman for over 90 minutes and was on her track when she was independently found.

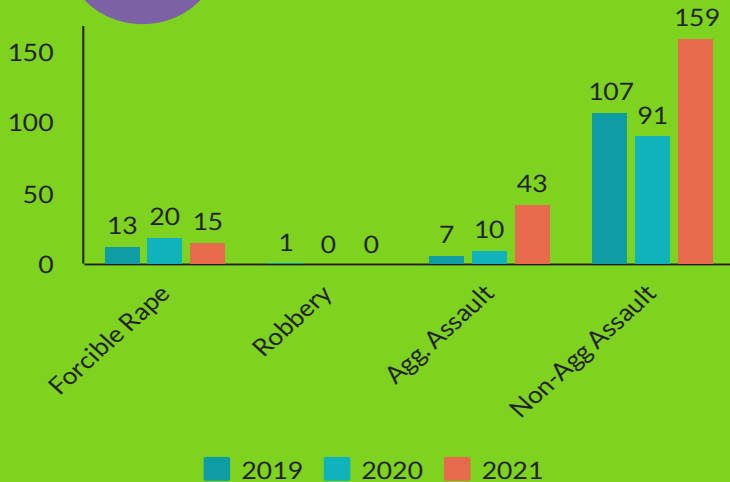

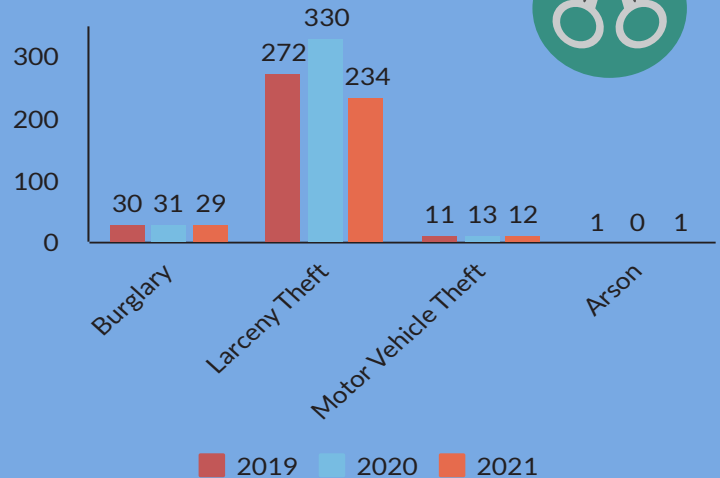

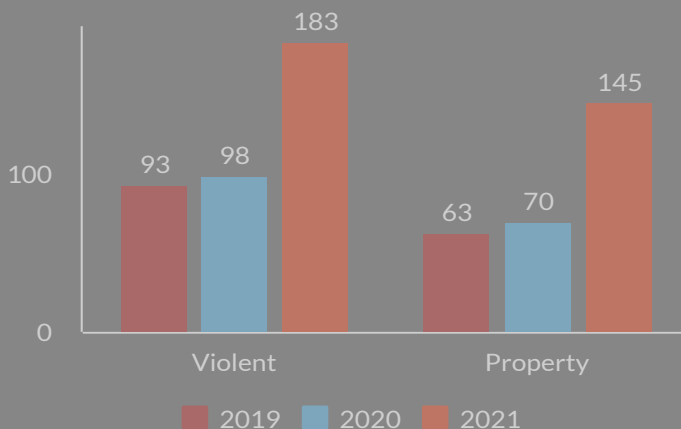

In 2021, 67 % of the total (major crimes) were cleared by arrest or other means (328 of 493). Wisconsin crime reporting changed to IBR (Incident Based Reporting) on January 1, 2021 which replaced UCR (Uniform Crime Reporting). IBR reports all crimes involved in an incident.

Drug Arrests



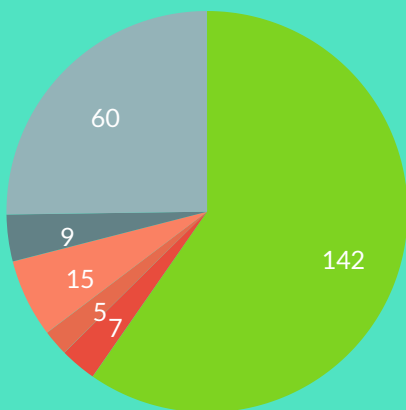

Yearly Drug Arrests

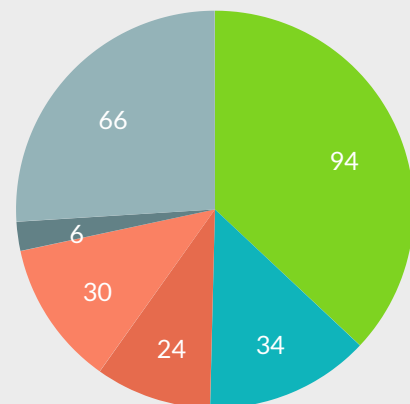

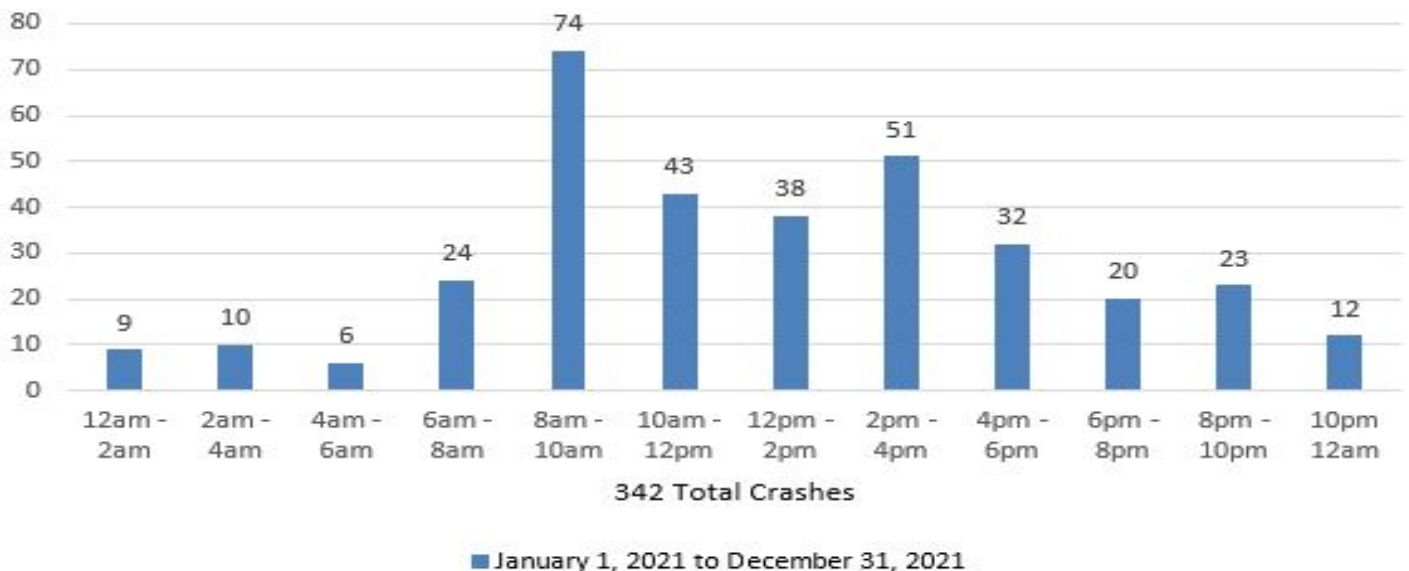


Traffic Crash Report



Reportable accident versus non-reportable accident: The difference between the two types of accidents is the estimated cost to repair damage sustained by a vehicle in the accident and whether a person is injured. An accident is considered reportable if the damage sustained by one vehicle is greater than \$1,000, a person is injured, or if damage to government property occurs with a value over \$200.

Crashes By Time Of Day



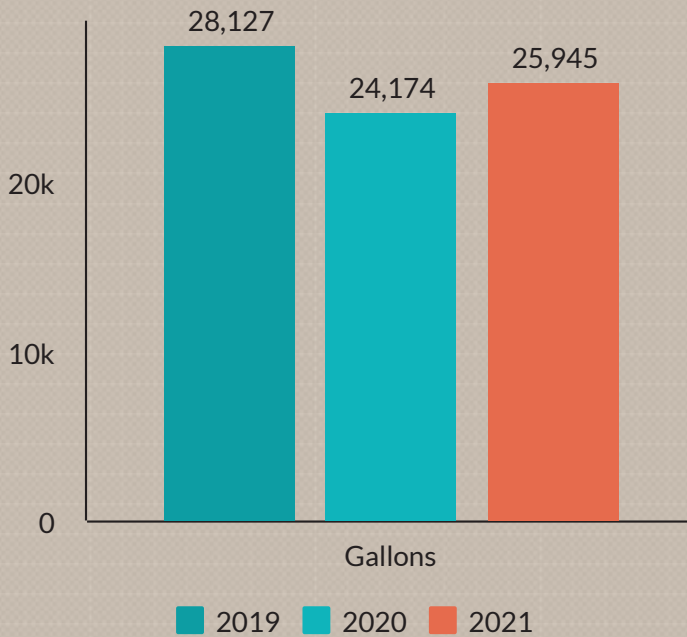


Vehicle Mileage Report

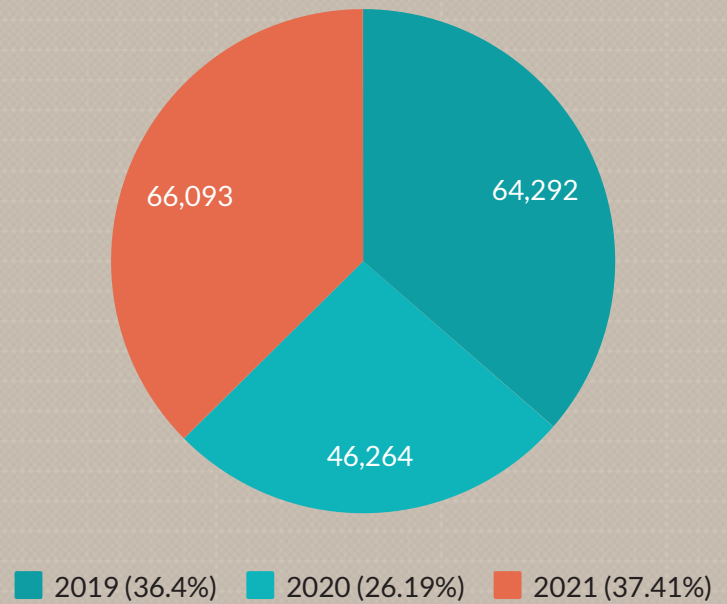

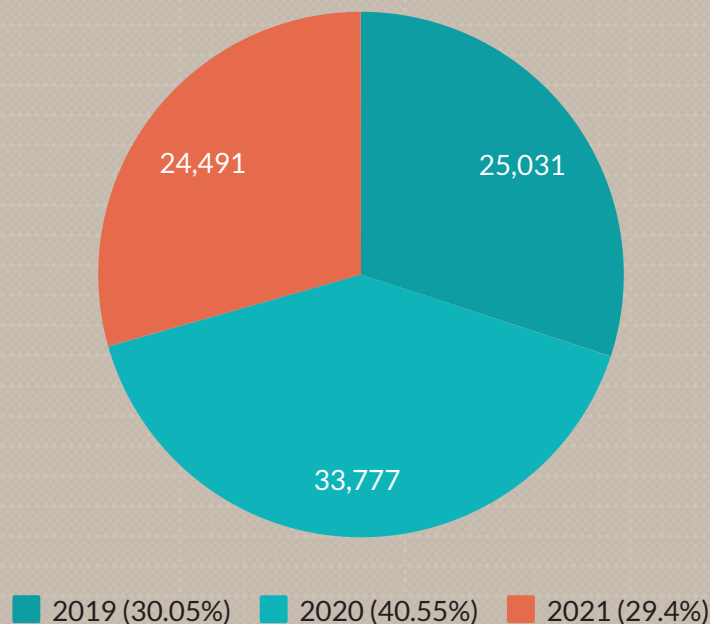
Gasoline Used

Maintenance Cost



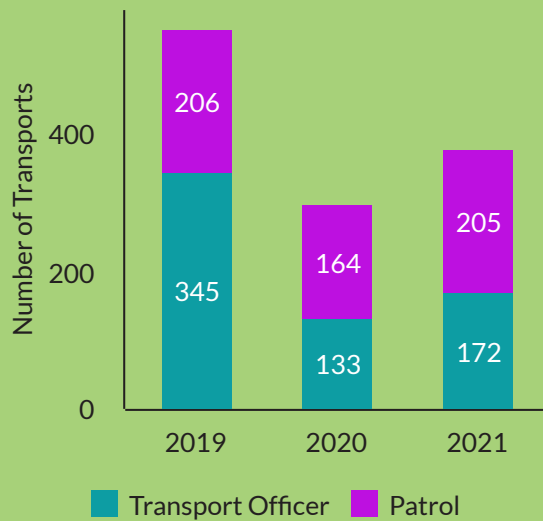
TRANSPORT & BOOKING STATISTICS

The Marshfield Police Department Canine Unit prides itself with the ability to provide a unique service that benefits our officers, department, and most importantly our citizens. The unit is comprised of two officers who train diligently with their canines to ensure the best possible outcome when they are deployed. The canines are trained to detect the odor of illegal drugs, track the scent of a person who may either be missing or hiding, and also to help officers locate evidence that a suspect may have discarded.

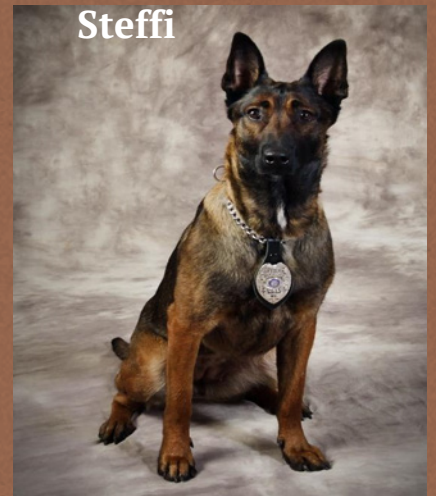

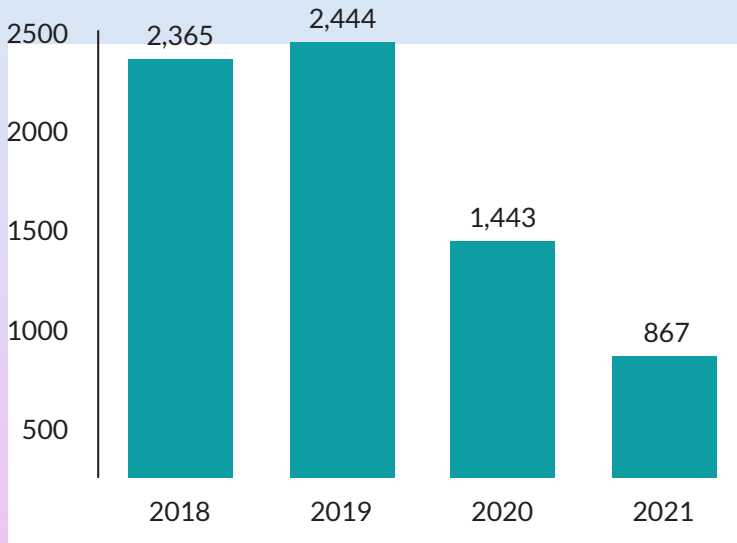

Ordinance Parking

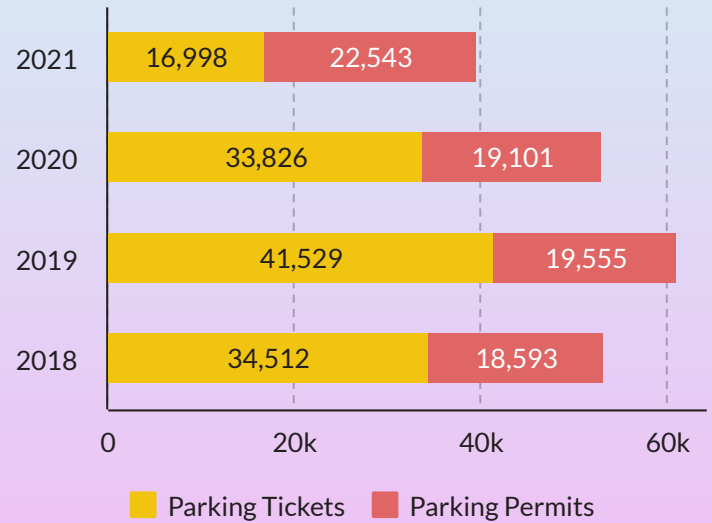

Parking Citations Issued



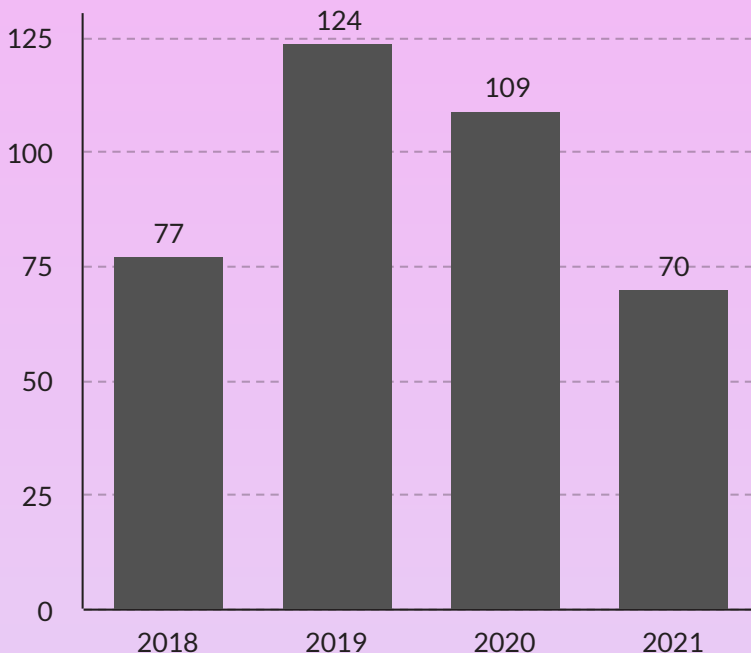

Money Deposited with the City Treasurer



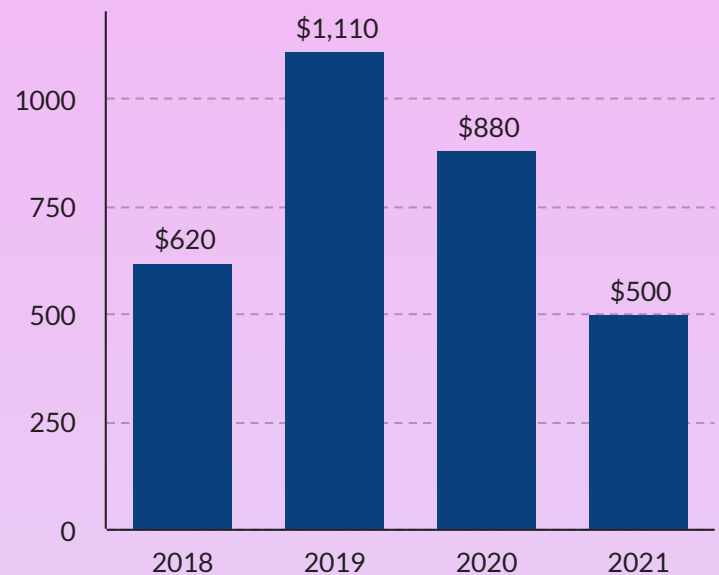

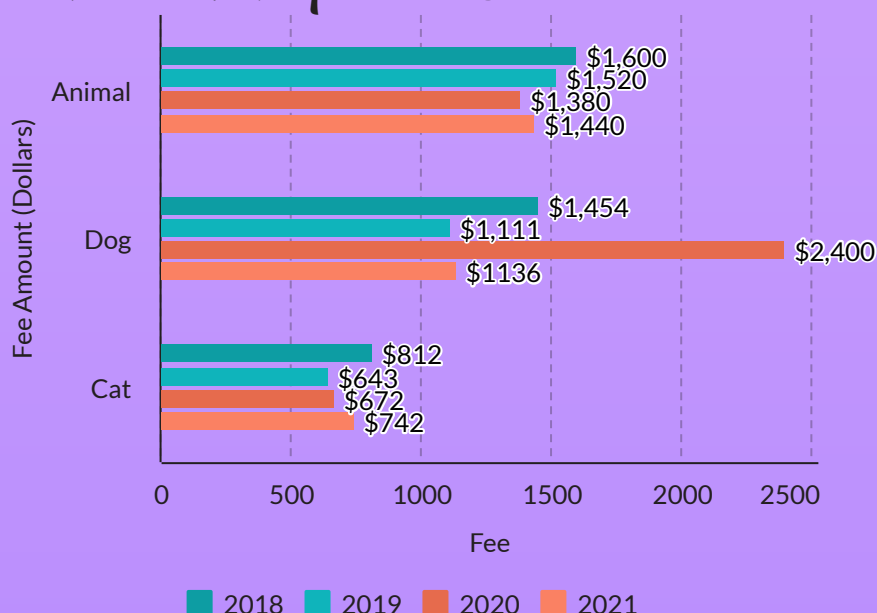


Total Animals at Large



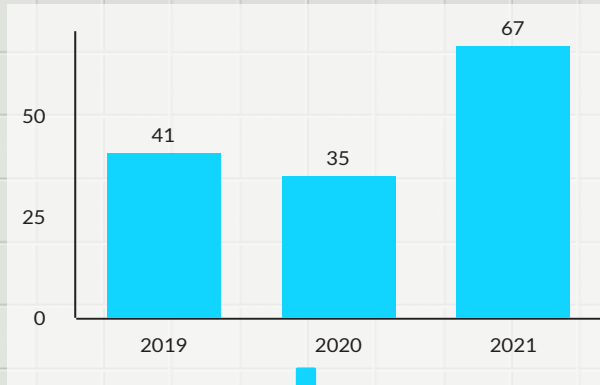
