



Ladies and Gentleman,

It's my pleasure to present to you the annual report for 2022! As you read the report I believe you will notice that we have compiled a comprehensive review of last year and organized the information in a way that is easy to read. Let me acknowledge a few highlights.

First, our department experienced several personnel changes. Three members of our full-time staff retired in 2022, adding to the shortage we were already experiencing at the time. By the end of 2022 we added six full-time members, bringing our staffing level to full strength. The change in personnel also brought promotions and new assignments to some of our most pivotal leadership roles. We gained a Chief, 2 Lieutenants, 1 lead officer, 1 detective, and 3 Field Training Officers.

We remain committed to building relationships with our community partners and our citizens. Some of the events we were honored to attend are Shop with a Cop, Cop on a Roof, Kiwanis Enormous Equipment Playground (KEEP), and many tours and school presentations. We enclosed some photos of these events in our report for your enjoyment.

Now, on to our 2022 crime figures. Our crime stats are compiled from our records using the Incident Based Reporting (IBR) system. IBR will separate violent crime stats from property crime statistics. Our department has an 89% clearance rate in violent crime and 62% clearance rate in property crime. Our overall clearance rate for all reportable crimes is 74%. You will also notice that we made 278 drug arrests this year with most being related to Marijuana, totaling 162 arrests. The second most common drug arrest was for Methamphetamine related cases.

Finally, 2022 brought a couple of opportunities to learn about our department history. First, a family member of our very first police chief, Albert Gerwing donated an awesome photo of him to our department. We felt that it was appropriate to include that photo on the cover of this annual report. Also included on the cover is Fred Beell, who I had the honor of inducting into the International Wrestling Hall of Fame in Albany NY this year.












Police Organizational Chart

HONOR AWARDS CEREMONY

Recipients of awards were recognized at the Marshfield Police Department's 3rd Annual Awards Ceremony held in the Drendel Room at the Second Street Community Center on February 25, 2022.

This award recognizes a non-sworn police department member for performing above and beyond their basic assignment. This member consistently exemplifies the department's mission, vision and values in their service to the department. Administrative **Associate Cindy** Gaetz was selected as our Member of the Year.



This award recognizes achievement by an officer for performing above and beyond the officer's basic assignment. Officer Jacob Maxson was selected as our Officer of the Year. Jake led the department in 2021 OWI arrests and participated in 634 traffic stops in 2021. Jake is a Negotiator on the Special Response Team and a valued member of the department.

The Career Achievement Award recognizes members of the department who have retired in good standing.

Lieutenant Dennis Keffer was hired as a Marshfield patrol officer on October 2, 1995 and served the department and community in a large number of capacities to include Auxiliary Liaison, Lead Officer, FTO, SRO and SRT member. Dennis retired on January 27, 2022 after over 26 years of service.










In 2022, 74 % of the total crimes were cleared by arrest or other means (819 of 1,104). Violent crimes clearance rate was 89 % (159 of 178). Property crime clearance rate was 62 % (178 of 286). Group B arrests for curfew, disorderly conduct, OWI, family offenses, liquor law violations and other offenses totaled 1,054 (659 adults & 395 juvenile arrests).





Drug Arrest Report 2021




Drug Arrest Report 2022










Reportable accident versus nonreportable accident: The difference between the two types of accidents is the estimated cost to repair damage sustained by a vehicle in the accident and whether a person is injured. An accident is considered reportable if the damage sustained by one vehicle is greater than \$1,000, a person is injured, or if damage to government property occurs with a value over \$200.









Vehicle Mileage Report




Maintenance Cost




TRANSPORT & BOOKING STATISTICS






The Marshfield Police Department Canine Unit prides itself with the ability to provide a unique service that benefits our officers, department, and most importantly our citizens. The unit is comprised of two officers who train diligently with their canines to ensure the best possible outcome when they are deployed. The canines are trained to detect the odor of illegal drugs, track the scent of a person who may either be missing or hiding, and also to help officers locate evidence that a suspect may have discarded.


