To support our mission, the Board of Education is asking voters to consider a \$350 million bond proposal that would fund district-wide improvements at a zero-tax-rate increase. The proposal focuses on safety, infrastructure, and providing students with state-of-the-art technology and future-ready learning environments.

District-wide renovations, efficiency upgrades, and exterior and interior upgrades and replacements.

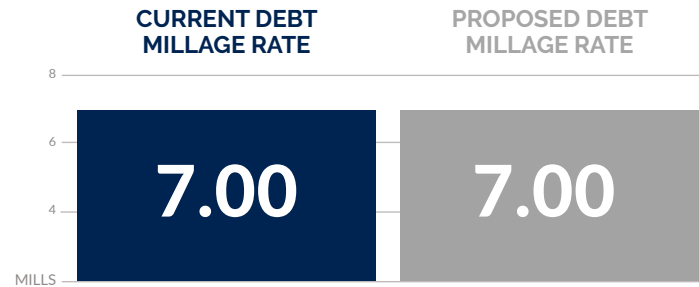
Safety & Security

Technology, Equipment & Furniture

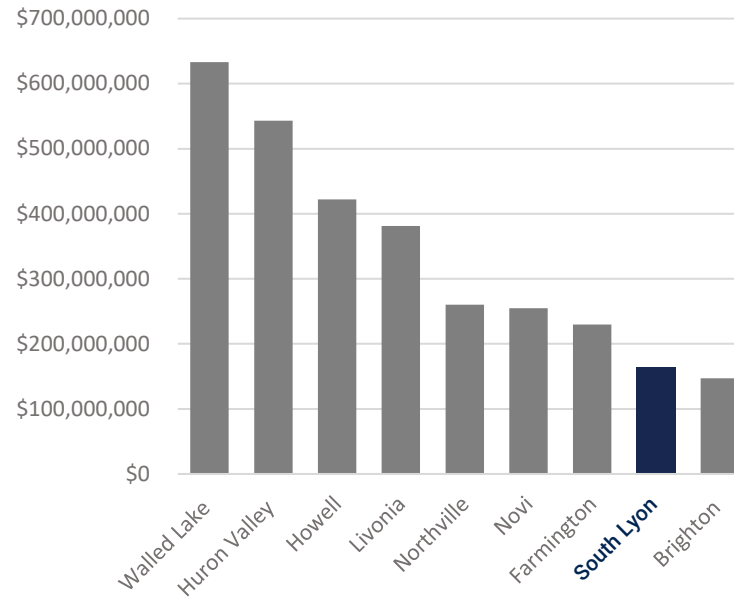
Equip learning spaces with upgraded technology and necessary equipment to create supportive learning environments.
