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# Greendale Health Department Addresses The Challenges of COVID-19

s we start the New Year, we want to take time to recognize the Greendale Health Department for all they did in 2020, and continue to do in 2021, to address the pandemic and keep our community safe. The Greendale Health Department has a relatively small staff of three full-time and four part-time employees. During this pandemic the Health Department has also hired multiple limited-term employees to assist with the efforts associated with the pandemic. They have worked nights and weekends to try to keep up with all that is required of the Health Department. Through it all, they have attended daily meetings with other Health Departments, performed contact tracing for positive cases, checked in with Greendale residents who have tested positive, worked with the School District and Village staff on coming up with COVID policies, and addressing positive cases in staff, distributed information to residents via social media, the website, newsletters and more.

Over the summer, staff worked to secure a temporary COVID testing site with the National Guard that took place at Greendale High School. Now that a vaccine has been approved, the Health Department also signed up to assist in

providing the vaccine. During Phase 1A the Health Department vaccinated residents that work in healthcare and our police and fire staff. During subsequent phases, they will also assist in distributing the vaccine. They also have many great volunteers assisting with the vaccine clinics. They are working with other Health Departments to plan bigger clinics to distribute the vaccine to larger groups of people.

The Greendale Health Department has been working hard to keep Greendale residents safe and informed on this ever-changing situation.

### **COVID-19 Update – Vaccines**

We all want to go back to living "normal lives" – whatever that may be post-pandemic. The Health Department has been answering numerous calls from residents regarding when they can get vaccinated. As vaccine supply increases, recommendations for who can get vaccinated will change. For example, the Health Department was able to begin vaccinating individuals 65+ years of age as soon as the State of Wisconsin recommendations allowed that change.

The Health Department is assisting in providing vaccines, but the supply is limited. Stayed tuned to the state media briefings, social media and our website to obtain more information on the vaccine and its distribution.

### How does the vaccine work?

Vaccines take a very small inactive part of a virus, like COVID-19, and teach your body how to respond before you come in contact with the live virus. The current vaccines available will need two doses for full protection, and it will take several weeks for the body to build full immunity (protection). Think of it like a training course for your immune system. For some people, this may be the first vaccine you will have received in a while – maybe since childhood – so you need to know that the vaccine will likely cause you to have a sore arm and possible fever. This is a normal reaction, and means your immune system is learning what to do.

Even after you are vaccinated, you will still need to practice good pandemic behavior while we build community immunity (when enough people in a population are vaccinated so that the virus can no longer spread, also called "herd immunity").

Community immunity will take months to reach – and to make it easier for the vaccine to do its job in the future, we need to reduce the spread of COVID-19 TODAY. We must continue to wear a mask, physically distance ourselves from others, and practice good hand hygiene.

# New Fire Department Equipment Addresses Needs of Cardiac Patients

he Greendale Fire Department is excited to announce the acquisition of its newest piece of equipment – the Lucas 3 Chest Compression System. This automatic CPR chest compression device is made by Stryker, the manufacturer of all of the Fire Department's lifting devices, stair chairs and power cots.

With the help of the Lucas 3 device, cardiac arrest patients in an emergency situation will receive effective, consistent

and continuous chest compressions as recommended by the American Heart Association (AHA).

A year ago, when newly named Fire Chief Kenten Kais took over the Department, he listed adding a Lucas device as one of his top priorities. As Chief Kais explains, "I helped the Menomonee Falls Fire Department acquire its first Lucas device, and I have seen first-hand how they work in

the field and in the ER (in most hospitals). After teaching CPR for many years, I firmly believe in the Lucas device, and believe every ambulance should have one."

The benefits of using a Lucas device are many. First, it frees up two staff from the prior process of performing chest compressions manually. This is because you used to have to switch staff from doing manual compressing every two minutes, given the exhaustive nature of doing manual chest compressions.

Now it only takes 20-30 seconds to get the device on the patient (who is not breathing and does not have a pulse). The procedure is simple. The back plate is placed under the patient, the device gets hooked on each side, the suction cup is lined up with the patient's mid-sternum and is pressed

down to the person's chest. The machine is now aligned and will have proper chest compression depth on every compression. The proper speed is set, and there are arm straps to keep the patient's arms out of the way.

Second, the Lucas device allows CPR to take place inside a moving ambulance. This was not the case with manual compressions that compromised the safety of the paramedics. Now two members of the Fire Department staff are freed up to carry on other tasks, such as helping with the airway or IVs,

> administering medications, manning the Zoll monitor (EKG machine), and talking to family members to keep them in the loop about what is going on. One paramedic can be dedicated to report writing and calling the EMS base to inform medical staff at the hospital what to expect when they arrive. Finally, the freed-up help allows staff to prep the cot and

ambulance for faster transport.

In addition, without the Lucas, paramedics who may have needed to go up or down stairs with the patient to get out to the ambulance had to stop manual CPR. This is not necessary with the Lucas device. It remains on the patient, and even as he/she is moved, the device will continue to do compressions at the proper depth and rate. All members of the Greendale Fire Department will continue to keep their CPR license up to date, since it is never known when compressions will need to be performed manually.

While the Greendale Fire Department has two ambulances, an average 28% of the time there is more than one call for service simultaneously. With only one unit so far, the Lucas is carried on Engine 41 that is usually sent on call to a person





who is reportedly not breathing or having a cardiac event. (This device will not be used on small children or babies, along with very large individuals.)

At the time of this writing and while only being on the job for three weeks, the Fire Department has used the Lucas device three times, with two of those three patients brought back to life as they were delivered to the hospital. All area hospitals also now have Lucas' devices in their ER rooms.

Many thanks to the Village Board for approving the purchase of this life-saving piece of equipment. The units are pricey (more than \$16,000 each), but well worth it to save more lives. Fundraising is already underway to purchase a second Lucas 3 – then each ambulance will carry its own unit.



# Best Wishes To Retiring Greendale Village Board Members

he Village Board will see some changes this spring, as two of its longstanding members have decided not to run for re-election. Village President James Birmingham and Village Trustee Sally Chadwick have both served on the Board since 1998, and their terms will expire in April of this year.

Best wishes to these two dynamic personalities who have given so much time and dedication serving Greendale! We deeply appreciate their service, and wish them well in their future endeavors.

### JIM BIRMINGHAM

Jim Birmingham was elected as a Village Trustee in 1998 and served in that role until 2015, when he ran for Village President. He has since served two terms in that role. During his tenure on the Board, Jim served on the Village's Plan Commission, Public Works Committee, Finance Committee, Park and Recreation Committee, Board of Tax Review, Community Development Authority, and Public Health, Welfare & Safety.

Jim loves his community and is very dedicated to volunteering. He has also served as a member of the Greendale Entertainment Association (GEA), and helps organize the summer Saturday night Gazebo concerts sponsored by the GEA.

In his professional career, Jim's background is in the recycling field, and his expertise has been beneficial to the Board when making decisions on recycling contracts and implementing the use of recycling carts. He has worked with the Park and Recreation Department to organize the residential paper-shredding events (the next one is scheduled for May 22 in the Municipal Parking lot). Birmingham also owns the Broad Street Coffee Shop in Historic Downtown Greendale.

Birmingham shares, "In April of 1997, as a concerned Greendale citizen worried about growing taxes, I attended a budget meeting of the Greendale Village Board. I was told by one of the then-Village trustees, 'If you think you can do better on taxes, why don't you run for a Trustee position,' which I did. Now here I am still serving Greendale 24 years later (18 years as a Village Trustee and six years as Village President).

"I am proud of my accomplishments and feel I did make a difference in a lot of ways over the years, especially keeping property taxes low (2% or less) over the past 10 years. Thank you to the voters who had faith in me to help make Greendale a great place to live," adds Jim. "It has been my honor to have served and represented Greendale residents, and I most certainly will miss it. But I will still be around, and will have more time now to serve you your favorite coffee at my shop, Broad Street Coffee."

### SALLY CHADWICK

Sally Chadwick was also elected as a Village Trustee in 1998, the same year as her colleague Jim Birmingham. She has held that position over seven terms. During her Board tenure, Sally has served on the Historical Commission, Public Works Committee and Public Health, Welfare & Safety Committee. She also served on the Plan Commission her entire time on the Board (1998-2021).

This "mover and shaker" was also a prior president of the Greendale Historical Society, and she remains an expert on all historic things in the Village. If you want to know anything about Greendale's history, Sally will be happy to share all she knows. She was involved in assembling the 75th anniversary time capsule that was buried in front of Village Hall, and she served on the Veterans' Memorial group that fundraised and planned for the memorial located at Southway/Broad Street.

Sally was also on the Library Committee, and was the secretary for the Gazebo Committee. She helped to research and develop informational items, articles and brochures, and tours for the Historical Society, and worked on the brick fundraising project for the Gazebo and Jaycee Park.

Sally and her young family moved to Greendale in 1977, with a son in tow and a daughter not far behind. According to Sally, "There were two influencing factors for our family to move to Greendale. We were already members of the Greendale Jaycees and Greendale Jaycettes, so we were hooked into community involvement and volunteering. With two children and the exceptional Greendale school system, the decision was a no brainer."

Adds Sally, "After all that, I wanted to give something back to Greendale because it had provided so much for our family. Running for a trustee position seemed to be a very good way to give back.

"Since day one, the satisfaction of serving the Greendale community has always been the joy of working with Village citizens and the incredible Greendale staff," Sally says proudly. "Trying to help, to listen and to make informed decisions for what is best for Greendale and its citizens has always been a priority - although at times, incredibly difficult."

Anyone who has passed the large white concrete building at 68th and Loomis Rd. – the one with the aquablue Kinetic logo emblazoned on the facade – may have wondered what this company is, and what exactly they do. Of all Greendale's

After moving to a small machine shop on 34th Street in Milwaukee, Masters founded The Kinetic Co. primarily to serve the sanitary paper industry.

Masters soon brought his son Joseph on board, and he, in turn, brought his own two sons, Cash and Jared, into the business. From an early age, these two young brothers

visited the shop with their dad on weekends, and learned the ropes from the ground up. Small, miscellaneous errands gave way to driving the delivery truck. Cash, in particular, gravitated toward the "mechanical" aspects of the business, while Jared was more of the "marketing guy."

When he turned 18 years old, Cash started running the machines, and was intrigued by the larger ones, particularly the "grinders." Over the next 25 years, Cash would be the key person to make decisions on new and rebuilt equipment purchases for the company. During this time, he also concentrated on the knife-making processes, and learned the "old-school" ways from the machinists who had spent their entire careers at Kinetic. Cash was always thinking of, and trying new and more efficient manufacturing methods by using new equipment and techniques.

Since 1970, Kinetic has occupied its 10-acre Green-

dale site. This state-of-the-art facility is home to highly skilled engineers, metallurgists, machinists and technical support professionals, many of whom have decades of experience satisfying Kinetic customers. and the world went into lock down, Cash was named president/owner.



# CONNECT Media Communications Provides Real-Life Professional Experiences

roviding high school students with real-life, professional experiences in their learning is a pillar of the Greendale Schools' strategic plan. GHS students enrolled in CONNECT Media Communications programming have first-hand knowledge of how area business professionals are adapting in their work lives during the pandemic. Students met in socially distanced and virtual environments this fall. In all environments, the two-and-a-half-hour class period is filled with learning, and students are showing their understanding of the concepts through a variety of projects.

Here is a window into CONNECT Media Communications 2020-2021.

## **Mentor Meetings Take Place**

Each student enrolled in CONNECT is assigned a mentor. Individual students were matched with a mentor in a field of the student's interest. Among them are American Sign Language interpreters, dietitians, physical therapists, civil engineers, marketing firm presidents and owners, youth soccer club, and many other working professionals who are donating their time to meet with Greendale students. Mentors work for firms from around the area, including Advocate Aurora Health Care, NEWaukee, Wisconsin Athletic Club, HGA Architects and Engineers, Kohl's Corporation, the U.S. Navy, and others.

Students had the opportunity to meet their mentors in a remote format during the first semester. Prior to the meeting, CONNECT instructors prepared the students to transition into the professional realm with lessons on business etiquette, proper email communication and online meeting procedures. Students are provided with a topic list for each month's meetings to help guide conversations.

"Our students report that they were able to make great connections with their mentors and have enjoyed hearing about their career paths," reports Pam Merkel, one of three CONNECT instructors. "(Students) are learning what their mentor's jobs are like on a daily basis, things they wish they would have known and how social media plays into the interview and networking process."

# **Showcasing Interviewing Skills**

Honing interviewing techniques and learning how to write open-ended questions are important skills students practiced in developing their first major video project: The Spotlight Interview. Students identified an individual who has an influence on the GHS community and conducted a Zoom interview with them. From there, each created a three-to-five minute video profile applying their questioning techniques. Students also learned how to conduct interviews and edit raw footage to create a finished story. All interviews were held remotely.

CONNECT Instructor Kate Wagner explained that the structure of the assignment was revised because of COVID-19 guidelines to keep students and interviewees safe. "This project required the filming to be done remotely, and students used different camera angles to keep it interesting, so we had to teach how that could be accomplished," she says.

## Other Semester-One Learning

The CONNECT curriculum is multidisciplinary and incorporates coursework in media writing, journalism, speech and film. Students have been identifying different types of stories and writing leads in preparation for writing a feature story for The Outlook, GHS's online publication; presented introductions, small talk, improvisational and demonstration speeches; and are exploring suspense in films. Researching and reviewing

works by the master of suspense, Alfred Hitchcock, is showing students how they can create suspense in their own productions.

Students successfully completing the CONNECT courses are eligible for nine college credits through UW-Oshkosh and UW-Green Bay at the reduced tuition cost of \$900. Courses include Writing for the Media (UW-Oshkosh), Introduction to Film (UW-Green Bay) and Fundamentals of Public Address (UW-Green Bay).

"CONNECT gives students a great opportunity to earn college credits while still in high school," reports Amy Hutter, another of the three CONNECT instructors. "Not only will this save families thousands of dollars, but it will also give students a better idea of the workload that a college course requires. And while these credits will be earned through UW-Oshkosh and UW-Green Bay, they will be accepted at almost any university. It really is a win-win for all."



# New GHS Robotics Teams Support Elementary STEAM Learning

he 2020-2021 school year is the inaugural year for the Greendale High School Robotics Team. This group of students is participating in the FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) competition. Because of national competition requirements due to COVID-19, GHS has two FTC teams competing this year: GHS Team 18368, A.L.I.E.N. and GHS Team 18367, GRAFFITI FTC (Greendale Robotics Advocating For FIRST and Inspiring Tomorrow's Innovators).

Both teams are working within the FTC requirements to build and program a robot to compete in a challenge that moves objects on a field to specific locations, and delivers foam rings into a set of goals at the end of the field. Those tasks must be completed both under driver control, and by programming the robot to move on its own. Starting a new program is not easy. These student-led teams have done a great job and are midway through their season, already completing significant projects to spread STEM in Greendale and beyond.

In addition to the robot challenge competition, the FTC program also provides awards to teams that engage their community in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) programming and education. Both teams are working with elementary school students to further an interest in these fields.

GHS Team 18368, A.L.I.E.N Partners for STEAMfest GHS Team 18368, A.L.I.E.N. brainstormed to find a creative solution that would allow a celebration of STEM education

to take place in all of Greendale's elementary schools this year despite COVID-19 social distancing restrictions.

STEAMfest (with "art" added as a fifth element of learning) debuted as STEMfest at Highland View Elementary in 2016, and has been an annual event there ever since. In past years, interested students were invited to explore a topic of their choice from any of the STEAM fields. Students conducted independent research and created displays to share their explorations with other learners in an all-school event held in the evening in the school gym where visitors enjoyed many hands-on activities. Adapting this traditional format to a COVID-safe event was a challenging task the GHS Robotics Club members tackled by developing STEAM Museums. These museums are websites with "rooms" dedicated to each of the STEAM fields.

Elementary school students were asked to share a short video explaining what they researched and what they learned in their investigation of the STEAM fields. These videos are uploaded to STEAM Museum websites where the work is showcased by school. All participants who submitted a video received a STEAM medal and certificate to reward them for their work. In addition, Team A.L.I.E.N. students assembled "take-home" packs with activities related to each of the STEAM fields for students to enhance their STEAMfest experience at home!

Greendale Elementary STEAM Museum websites opened in January, and will remain open so students can keep sharing their STEAM fun with the world. Check out the STEAM Museum web pages from this link on the Greendale Schools website: greendalesteamfest.weebly.com.

## GRAFFITI Works "Side-by-Side" With Kids

GHS students on team GRAFFITI have been busy working on outreach projects involving coaching students, creating take-home kits and inspiring younger students to discover careers in engineering.

This fall, students on GRAFFITI coached elementary students from Greendale, in another FIRST Program called FIRST LEGO League Explore. The program lets second and third graders focus on solving problems, teamwork and learning the basics of programming a robot, all while having lots of fun. One participant, Eden, described it perfectly when she said, "My favorite part of LEGO League Explore was everything, because it was super fun." Bryn, a third-grader from Canterbury, indicated she "liked building everything and building with everyone here (virtually)."

For its second outreach project, GRAFFITI created original "Icicle Imagination take-home STEM kits." They introduced STEM to elementary students in Greendale and extended their work outside of the community to students at St. Augustine Prep in the City of Milwaukee. To serve these students, the team created 300 bilingual take-home STEM kits. GHS students used their Spanish language skills to make these fun activities accessible to Spanish-speaking households. These kits consisted of fun, winter-themed experiments for students to take home. Student favorites included watching a pinecone's scales close when getting wet and learning how water can make the sugar in candy dissolve.

GRAFFITI team members also made a virtual appearance in the Greendale third grade classrooms. They read "Rosie Revere, Engineer" and shared FIRST


with the students. At the end of the meetings, so many students showed interest in STEM. GRAFFITI is working to expand this program to reach many more students, and have an even greater impact on the community.

# Greendale Schools' Staff Celebrate MLK Day With Day of Service

# Schools Expand Student Access To Great Books During Pandemic

ven in this somewhat nontraditional school year, Greendale middle and elementary school students still have lots of access to great books. Greendale Middle School students have a variety of options to help them maintain their literacy skills.

The school tripled the eBook and digital audiobook collections and made it easy for students to access them using their school Google login. The GMS Bookhub service allows students to easily request print books and then pick them up in the library or from a library table in front of the office. Programs like Battle of the Books, a book club called the Lit Squad, and the Fall Into Reading Challenge offered opportunities to connect, socialize, and earn rewards for reading and other literacy-related activities.

In the fall, Sandra Speare, library media specialist at Greendale Middle School, shared a "GMS Reads! Book Ideas Video" with the students. It discussed the most popular books in the GMS library. These books are the most checked-out year after year, and many of them are ones that students like to read over and over.

In the elementary schools, younger students are visiting the library weekly for a "walk-thru" book check out, relates Linda Thomas, the District-wide elementary library coordinator. There is a wide variety of books on display on the tables, and students walk through and choose, taking the ones they touch. A quick visit to the circulation desk and they are on their way. Older students have learned to log into the library

automation software and use the catalog to locate and request books of interest. The books are then pulled, checked out and delivered to their classrooms on a cart. The library requests are made weekly.

"Our virtual students are able to request books weekly as well, utilizing our lobby pick-up for library books," explains Mrs. Thomas. "All books requested before noon on Wednesday are available for pick up after 2 p.m. on Thursday each week. We have many students taking advantage of this service!" (All books returned to the library are quarantined for three days before circulating again.)

In addition, all of our students have 24/7 access to 800+

eBooks and nearly 50 audiobooks in our elementary library collections. Pandemic or not, it's a great time for reading, no matter what your age or grade level!

Commemorating Computer Science Education Week in December, students in grades 5K-5 at Highland View



In the coming months, District administrators and building principals will be developing a plan that defines what hazardous weather matters could affect the schools, how the District will monitor for those weather hazards, and how it will respond and communicate to staff, students and the public in those situations. # MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN 2020 Greendale Education Foundation Continues to Support Our Schools

he year 2020 was a challenging one for all, but the Greendale Education Foundation continued to make an impact on our schools, students and staff.

2020 support for a variety of educational programs and scholarships included the actions listed below. However, the Foundation urgently needs your help now to continue its mission to support and enhance education in our community.

KICKING OFF 2020 A Foundation grant helped Greendale Elementary Schools present "Rosa Parks and Friends" and "North by Night: More Heroes of the Underground Railroad" to students to complement their Black History Month curriculum. Students were introduced to key figures in Black American history in a way that brought those figures to vibrant life.

**FEBRUARY 2020** The Foundation had the opportunity to support some of Greendale's youngest learners by providing funding for a collection of interactive, multi-lingual books and

games for 4K students that could be sent home, allowing families who might also be learning English, to support in-school learning. Soon, that sort of take-home information would become even more important.

That month, the Foundation also provided funding for a set of self-regulation and mindset books and tool kits for learners. No one knew at the time how important students' abilities to persevere outside of a traditional school setting would be, but even before COVID-19, these books and tools directly helped students meet their educational goals and learn new skills.

MARCH 2020 The Foundation provided a major grant to Greendale Elementary Schools to enhance their reading rooms with new books supporting themes of inclusion, equity and diversity to help align with the Districts' goals. In a time where students are feeling more isolated than ever, having access to books that help all students feel supported and included is incredibly valuable.

JUNE 2020 The Foundation was honored to once again award four \$1,000 scholarships to Greendale High School seniors. These scholarship winners: Mason Hanizeski, Isabella Thiel, Alyssa Tomczak and Van Nguyen were exceptional and inspirational to all! The awards included scholarships in memorial of Gertrude Bates and Eriks Klavins, and the Greendale Organization to Encourage Scholarship.

interactive books was funded

by the Greendale Education Foundation for 4K students.

SEPTEMBER 2020 A grant to Greendale Schools provided funding to purchase customized bicycles (with accessibility enhancements for students unable to use traditional bikes). These bikes allow every student to enjoy and gain the benefits of biking. Because exercise and normalcy are so essential to learning at all times, not just during a pandemic, these bikes provide an essential support for the students that need them.

The Foundation also provided funding for individual sensory bins for 5K students, since students could no longer share bins during COVID-19.

In addition, the Foundation provided funding to help start a robotics team at Greendale High School (see pg. 20).

In 2020, Foundation grants totaled \$19,535 to support Greendale schools, students and staff. This adds to the almost \$400,000 it has provided since the organization was founded in 1997.

However, just like 2020 itself, there were obstacles. Major GEF fundraisers like "Mulch Madness," the "School's Out" event in Historic Downtown Greendale, and "Food Truck Frenzy" were all canceled due to COVID-19. In 2021, the "Cheers to Education" fundraising event has already been indefinitely postponed as well. This has resulted in a dangerous drop in the amount of financial support the Foundation can provide to Greendale Schools.



# A Welcome Addition to Our Garden Community

Spring is on its way – we promise! The snow and ice will soon give way to fragrant lilacs, beautiful hydrangeas and flowering crabapple trees. Greendale's Garden Community will soon be alive with color and plantings that represent the Village's early days.

As you have seen in past issues of Life in the Village, the restoration of the Original on Apple Court is nearly complete. Thanks to the generous help of the many donors and volunteers, the Greendale Historical Society has brought back to life a home that needed tender loving care - along with gallons of paint, stain and a few drops of perspiration! Looking through the restored original windows at the snow-covered yard, all thoughts are on spring and making plans for landscaping. A new driveway, sidewalks and patio have been installed, and the new landscaping this spring will be the "icing on the cake." The Apple Court Original will continue the legacy of Greendale's "Garden Community," that is part of the original concept and design of the Village of Greendale.

Greendale planner Elbert Peets made it clear that this Greenbelt town was to be a Garden Community from the very beginning – with generous green spaces, public parks and tree-lined streets. This inspired residents to create their own gardens. Houses located very close to the street allowed for bigger yards than in the city from where folks came. This made room for flowers, vegetables and ample room for kids to play. That same plan is being followed now, and includes flowering plants and trees typical of the early days of Greendale, and even a tomato plant or two in honor of Greendale's WWII Victory Gardens.

A walk along Broad Street to Gazebo Park, the Veterans Memorial and Lions Park shows how Greendale's "Main Street" contributes to the Garden Community concept. Grandhaven's annual flower plantings along Broad Street make the Village Center a special place to visit. Just past the Broad Street stores are the many pathways of Greendale.

One of the longest paths leads to 5597 Apple Court. A look inside shows the interior restored to its original appearance with oak floors, 1930s metal kitchen cabinets, and yes, those Ponderosa pine-beamed ceilings. Outside, Peets' landscape plans will be honored. So, in these last days of winter, it's time to review the Burpee seed catalog and others, to plan the landscaping for the next addition to Greendale's Garden Community.

The restoration of Apple Court has been spearheaded by the Greendale Historical Society with the help of many volunteers – this has been a true community project! They have brought craftsmanship and knowledge about what the Originals looked like and how they were lived in – and loved.

We now need YOUR help. Please share your knowledge, memories or photos of the designs, plants and gardens from the past. Your input is extremely valuable.

The Original on Apple Court will be more than a static display house with gardens to walk by and admire. It will be a welcoming, living and breathing home – a historic link to Greendale's past that will be available for tours, special events and overnight stays. ho would have thought what started out as a simple conversation between a married Greendale couple would turn into a popular and very successful summer market, now going on 30 years! Before

farmers markets started popping up all over, Greendale residents Jim and Bonnie Cyganiak initiated the Market project when they were members of the former Greendale Promotion Committee. In the early days, only fresh produce was offered – then flowers and plants were added, along with bakery goods. Today, the Greendale Downtown Market is a shopper's delight, with the addition of handmade crafts, honey, apples, handmade florals, cheeses, meats, eggs, CBD products, pre-packaged food items and more. Check the Park and Rec. website weekly for a list of vendors at each market. You can also find custom-created Greendale logo'd merchandise, like T-shirts, sweatshirts, mugs, and dish towels.

Although co-founder Jim Cyganiak is no longer with us (he passed away in March 2020), he certainly would have been thrilled to help celebrate this year's 30th anniversary of the Market. According to his wife, Bonnie, "The Greendale Market has been successful from day one," she explains. "Greendale residents have always loved to come downtown, visit with friends, and stock up with delicious homegrown produce. What a wonderful way to start the weekend," she adds.

The Greendale Market was first held in the municipal parking lot, in front of the Hose Tower on Parking Street. Now with so many additional vendors, the Market takes up the entire block of Broad Street in Historic Downtown Greendale. Today's Market is managed by the Park and Recreation Dept.

"The Market was an important part of my husband's life, and my life as well," Bonnie continues. "Our residents and farmers have always been so supportive of this weekly summer event, and we could not have done it without the many volunteers that helped."

Jackie Schweitzer, director of the Park and Recreation Department and manager of the Market, explains, "We consider our Market to be one of the best in the area, a feeling documented by the same farmers and vendors who have been returning for decades to sell their goods."

Bud Schmit, of Schmit's Farm Produce, agrees. He is one of the original farmers who has participated in the Greendale Market since 1991 – and will be there again this year. "This market is so well organized, and the vendors are really taken care of," says Bud. "Jackie and her husband bend over backwards to take care of us, and customers in Greendale are so appreciative to be able to buy fresh produce direct from the farmers."

Things will be a bit different this year (as was last year's Market) with special protocol in place to keep everyone safe (see guidelines below). But there will still be plenty of the freshest produce in town, along with all the other products available for purchase. You don't want to miss the Market every Saturday this summer (June into October). Exact dates will be posted soon. # What You Need to Know About This Summer's Market (COVID-dependent)

- Do not attend the market if you are sick.
- Masks are recommended (but not required).
- Limit the number of people with you.
- Follow a clockwise rotation while shopping.
- Minimal customer handling of produce/products.
- Do NOT bring your own market bag.
- No consumption of food/beverages on the street.
- Limit your time at the market.
- Keep your social distance of 6 ft.
- NO seating will be available/no samples will be offered.
- NO dogs/pets are allowed!
- Practice good hygiene before, during and after your time at the market.

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# BRICKS, ANYONE? Own a Piece of Greendale!

he structure in Gazebo Park on Broad Street signifies our "historic downtown." It is a gathering place, a photo opportunity and a landmark for local residents. Beyond these visual cues, though, it also is a symbol of a vibrant, local club.

Desiring a distinctive place to congregate in the Village, the Greendale Lions Club was the sponsor for the initial building of the Gazebo – raising funds, designing the structure and securing the labor force (including volunteers). In the end, they produced a structure that has not only become an integral part of the Village of Greendale, but also continues to last as a memorial for events, Lions Club members and the families of Greendale. How? The foundation of the Gazebo is a tapestry of bricks that tell their own story of the history of Greendale.

As part of the initial fundraising for the Gazebo, the Lions Club developed the idea of selling bricks so the community could take part in contributing to the Village's new gathering spot. Advertised as a way to memorialize a family, an individual, a company or a special group of people, residents purchased bricks so their names and/or personalized messages could be part of the base of the Gazebo. The response was overwhelming and the Lions Club sold enough bricks to complete the Gazebo floor. Today, these bricks form a solid foundation on which bands play, weddings take place and prom pictures are taken.

After these initial bricks were sold and installed, the Lions discovered that there was still an interest from many people. With no need to raise funds any longer and not having any space left for bricks on the floor of the Gazebo, the Club had to determine a way to satisfy all of these requests. Exercising their creative spirit, the idea of having bricked paths leading to the Gazebo was decided upon as the solution. The paths were implemented and for many years after the initial fundraising effort, many bricks continued to be sold and installed.

Taking a stroll around the Gazebo, on the paths and (most recently) around the water "bubbler" shows how a community has kept an old tradition alive as the bricks have become more creative in their presentation and wording. Also, the purchasers have become more varied beyond individuals and families. Companies, groups and high school classes now blend with the more familiar names scattered about Gazebo Park.

It has been more then 25 years since the Gazebo was constructed (it was dedicated on 8/13/95). Unfortunately, time can dim the memory of a localized effort that gave residents a sense of ownership in "their" Village. The ability to purchase bricks never stopped, it just landed "under the radar" as a quiet option available. The Lions Club wants to resurrect the idea that owning a piece of the Village of Greendale will always hold meaning for many residents.

Did you know that the tradition of purchasing bricks at the Gazebo still continues today? For only \$35, anyone can imprint a name in the history of Greendale. Consider creating a lasting imprint for yourself, your family, a special someone, group or company that will broaden the rich tapestry already in place.

### **BUY A GAZEBO ENGRAVED BRICK!**

The Greendale Lions Club is accepting donations for engraved bricks to be placed in the path in front of the gazebo. Brick requests received during the year and before December 1 are installed the following spring.

Single bricks will be engraved with names (no message) for a donation of \$35. Two or more bricks will be engraved for a donation of \$30 each. Applications will be accepted only if corresponding payment is made online for the proper amount.

In addition to the Resale, we plan on expanding our weekly Saturday night Gazebo shows ("Music on the Green") by booking new acts, offering a beer/wine pop-up bar and encouraging take-out from Village restaurants. The shows will take place every Saturday night during the summer except during the Lions Club 4th of July festival and during the probable return of Village Days in August.

Planning is already underway for the four-day Village Days tradition which will be held on August 12, 13, 14 and 15 (COVID-dependent). We will again be featuring "Greendale's largest happy hour" to kick it off on Thursday night, a new and improved family entertainment area, a Sunday Family Day, and the return of the GEA Hose Tower entertainment stage.

While nothing is guaranteed these days, our members remain hopeful that we can get through this year on a positive note. With hard work and community support, we hope to come out on the other side better than ever.




