NATIONAL CHAMPS! Greendale High School Game Day LIVE! Team Wins NHS offense Title

The much-sought-after white satin jackets have come home to Greendale! The mark of the highest achievement at the Universal Cheerleaders Association (UCA) National High School Cheerleading Championship (NHS offense), Greendale High School students recently achieved National Champion status. The team competed successfully in the Varsity Game Day LIVE! Division during the 2024 UCA Championships at The Walt Disney World Resort® in Orlando, Fla., last month. The 2024 title is Greendale High School's first National Championship. Last year, the team finished in second place at Nationals.

Greendale's Game Day LIVE! Team is a collaboration of GHS Varsity Cheer and Pep Band. The nearly 70-student

team began work on its performance months ago. Cheerleaders mastered cheers, stunts and pyramids and Pep Band members learned the music and dance moves necessary to create the award-winning performance. The team is led by longtime Greendale High School staff Tina Zamjahn-cheer coach, and Tom Reifenberg-director of bands.

Game Day LIVE! is a newer UCA division. Inspired by the sights and sounds of a school's Friday night football game, the category combines sideline cheering, crowd leading, a fight song and live music from the pep band.

Voters Asked to Weigh In on District Funding Through Operational Referendum

Greendale Schools and many other school districts around the state are in a funding crisis. When budgeting for the current school year, Greendale Schools faced a \$1,588,000 deficit! Additional deficits are forecasted for future years. This is because state law that limits school spending has not been increasing in line with the rate of inflation.

All school districts around the state are underfunded by more than \$3,300 per student because of this lag in state allowances. This creates a gap of almost \$9,000,000 per year to catch up with inflation rates over the past 15 years.

The 2023-2024 school budget has been balanced using fund balance. This one-time funding from the District's savings is not sustainable. To address this matter, the Board of Education considered two options to balance the budget:

1. Reducing School District programming and staff
- OR
2. Asking voters to exceed the state-imposed revenue limit through an Operational Referendum.

In November 2023, the School Board passed a resolution to go to Operational Referendum and let the voters in Greendale decide how to fund their schools in future years.

How Approving the Referendum Affects Taxes

Not all referendums result in higher property taxes. For Greendale taxpayers, if approved, the referendum tax impact will be less than 1 percent of the total tax levy, or approximately \$100,000 overall.

Here are examples of the tax impact of this increase if the Operational Referendum is approved:

- If a resident's home is assessed at \$250,000, the projected tax increase is \$13 per year.

- If a resident's home is assessed at \$350,000, the projected tax increase is \$18 per year.
- If a resident's home is assessed at \$450,000, the projected tax increase is \$23 per year.
- The mill rate, tax rate per \$1,000 of home value, is projected to increase just 5 cents for school taxes.

What Does My Vote Mean?

The question on the April 2, 2024 ballot is written in legally required language. **If the majority of voters vote "NO" on the ballot, this means the following for Greendale Schools:**

- Projected 10% reduction in instructional staff (20-25 teachers).
- Reduction in the variety of programming and possible elimination of programs not required by law.
- Increased class sizes.
- Reduction of student support services.
- The Board of Education maintains its ability to prepay debt authorized in the 2007 and 2018 referendums.

If the majority of voters vote "YES" on the ballot, this means the following for Greendale Schools:

- Maintaining current level of school programming.
- Estimated tax increase of about \$20 per household per year starting in 2025.
- The Board of Education commits to suspend prepayment of District debt. Annual payments continue as required.

School Funding Is Complex

State law regulates the maximum amount of funding schools can receive per student. This total includes state funding and local property taxes. State aid is determined by the Wisconsin State Legislature in its Biennial Budget process. Tax levy amounts are determined using a complex formula and how much a school district can levy for operations is determined based on the revenue limit set by the state.

Through an operational referendum, the community can give the School Board the ability to set a tax levy in a different fund to maintain the Greendale Schools experience, which includes priorities set by the community to "Cultivate Excellence in Every Student." The referendum process has helped hundreds of school districts across the state keep up with the inflation of fixed costs. When voters pass a referendum, they tell the state that they want to increase funding for their local schools.

Understanding the Operational Referendum Question

In 2007 and 2018, Greendale taxpayers gave the District permission, through a building referendum vote, to borrow money for improvements at the high school (2007) and in all Greendale school buildings (2018). For the past few years, the District has been prepaying (paying extra) on those loans.


The April 2 spring election ballot includes a question for Greendale voters. This Operational Referendum question is asking the taxpayers for permission to add \$2,500,000 per year for the next five years to the District's operational fund through the tax levy. The operational fund pays for student programming, curricular materials, transportation, teacher salaries and other costs of running the schools.

If the Operational Referendum is approved, the School Board has committed to stop the prepayment of the debt and return to paying the required payment amounts. It will levy (tax) to collect a similar amount of tax dollars. This will keep the overall tax levy stable. Those funds would be used for operations instead of prepaying debt. This "shifting of buckets" will allow the District to project less than a one-percent increase in resident taxes over the five-year period.

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GHS Student Equity Team Makes Impact on Schools and Community

BELONGING. That is the vision of the Greendale High School Student Equity Team. Known as SET, this group of more than two dozen high schoolers in grades 9 through 12 works to represent, educate, include, unite and celebrate all student voices in their school. They do this by leading and supporting a variety of learning opportunities for themselves, their schoolmates and the greater community.

According to Maggy Olson, Greendale Schools' director of equity and instruction, the SET Team exists to amplify the voices of all students – the people who are living the experiences in Greendale Schools. Students apply to participate in the group and select which programs and opportunities to join. The high schoolers collaborate on projects and make new friendships among students from all grade levels. Since its founding in 2021, the group has planned school-wide assemblies, researched influential Americans and produced informational videos on their accomplishments, and raised awareness of the value of diversity in the world and the community.

"The diverse makeup of the SET team helps to exemplify our GSD belief of ALL means ALL," Ms. Olson explains. "This understanding that all of our students can and will succeed is so important. The students in SET take this work seriously. Their actions and activities help us to ensure every student has a sense of belonging, and we have equitable outcomes for ALL of our students."

The SET team is an important part of the District team that honors the diverse identities, experiences and contributions that shape our community. Students participate in the District's celebrations of Federal heritage months. They provide organizational support

for Community Connections events. Additionally, they provide messaging and opportunities for students at all grade levels to learn about the histories, cultures, traditions, achievements and ongoing journeys of groups who are celebrated in nationally recognized heritage months.

"Through the work of the SET team, all Greendale students benefit from learning about the rich cultural diversity of our world every day!" Ms Olson states.

GHS Spanish teacher Marisa Bernal is the staff advisor for the Student Equity Team. Ms. Bernal works closely with the students on their projects and supports their learning through participation. Ms. Bernal understands first-hand the impacts SET is having on the community.

"I believe that our Student Equity Team members are leaving a lasting significance on individuals, our community and our school history," Ms. Bernal says. "We are recognizing, celebrating and embracing the differences that make us beautiful human beings. Each project concentrates on lifting voices that are historically unheard. Unity brings forth an aspiration for doing good for all. We are empowering our community as a whole, and promoting a cohesive influence."

She adds, "The growth of our students as individuals has been an incredible and admirable journey. Our Student Equity Team members envision a community of love, acceptance and trust where diversity flourishes with understanding from an open mind and an open heart."

He is a member of GHS Sources of Strength, the Student Equity Team, an officer for GHS DECA, and a three-sport athlete (soccer, swim and track). Sean is also the District 15 representative for the Milwaukee County Youth Commission.

The Milwaukee County Youth Commission was established in 2002 and re-established in 2022. According to the county website, the organization exists to serve and advance the


interests of Milwaukee County youth, make advisory recommendations about policy and budgetary decisions to the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors, and advance Milwaukee County's mission of achieving racial equity. Youth Commissioners serve a one- or two-year term.

"My role as a youth commissioner is to provide a voice for our youth and the future of Milwaukee County," Sean explains. "When action is taken in our community, it is usually adults making the decisions. Our role is to provide insight into how that action may affect the youth of Milwaukee County."

The Youth Commission meets 11 times in the calendar year. Sub-committees meet an additional five times. Sean is a member of the Governance and Finance committee. In addition to the meetings, commissioners participate in a variety of government-related group activities and outings. In February, the group traveled to Madison to meet Governor Evers and state legislators at the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) conference.

Sean became interested in this position after hearing the goals of the Youth Commission and learning how those goals work to ensure that youth are heard. "This truly connected to me as a person and inspired me to join," he explains. "I know this position will allow me to help others whose voices aren't heard."

"I believe that the way to change the system is to be a part of it," he adds. "I'm glad to say that I can help my community in this role and I will do everything to make this community better for everyone within it."

Ashley has many fond memories of her time as a student in Greendale Schools. To her, the experiences solidified belonging in this community.



A FOCUS ON SUMMIT PLACE: Innovative Program Supports Students Learning Life Skills with Help from Greendale Education Foundation

Believe it or not, students' experiences in high school aren't the same as what they will encounter after graduation. Many students make the transition to their post-high school lives on their own, but for others it can be a challenge.

This February, the Greendale Education Foundation was excited to provide a grant to help students participating in Greendale Schools' Summit Place program make this transition as successfully as possible.

Summit Place is a community-based program for our adult students with disabilities ages 18-21 who have completed their four years of academic requirements for graduation at the high school, but still need some independent living and vocational skills training.

According to Greendale Schools, Summit Place "helps adult students with disabilities build the skills needed to transition into the next phase of life. This unique and cutting-edge transitional program is focused on work-based learning experiences, strengthening self-advocacy skills, preparing for post-secondary education, exploring recreation and leisure activities, and building social and independent living skills." The program is based in a furnished apartment where life skills are practiced and, in the community, where students take part in the transition from high school to post-school life firsthand.

With the \$1,000 grant from the Foundation, Summit Place students will have the opportunity to experience the community they live in by participating in recreation and leisure activities with their peers (both disabled and non-disabled) such as bowling, seasonal field trips, eating at restaurants, music and art sensory classes, museum visits, participating in adaptive sports, attending musical performances, and attending life skills workshops.

At Summit Place, program components are tailored to each student's individual needs. Teacher-created slides and lessons accompany each activity, and lessons focus around the five "W's: **W**hat students will be learning, **W**here they will be, **W**ho they might see there from the community, **W**hen they might use this experience on their own, and **W**hy it is important for the community to have such an activity.

Not every life skill can be learned in high school. The Greendale Education Foundation is proud to be part of a community that makes sure every student receives the keys they need to become vital members of the community.

"Heavy Metal" Careers Get Rock Star Treatment at MATC

Crystal Briseno lights up when she talks about heavy-duty trucks. Her dream is to repair and maintain large, diesel-powered vehicles used to haul garbage, plow snow, carry cargo and deliver freight.

"I have always wanted to work on the big equipment," she says. "I have already spent a lot of time on cars and automobiles, but I always was interested in diesels. I have always wanted to find out how they run, how they function, how they operate."

Thanks to Milwaukee Area Technical College and a scholarship from the rock band Metallica, Briseno is making her dream a reality. She graduated in December 2023 with a technical diploma from MATC's Diesel and Powertrain Servicing program and is working full time as a mechanic at a Milwaukee truck maintenance shop.

"When I told my family I wanted to pursue this as a career, they said MATC had a really good program," Briseno says. "I am very happy with my decision to attend MATC. I have learned time management and skills management – all the skills I need to be successful in this profession."

Diesel and Powertrain Servicing is one of several industrial, "heavy metal" programs in MATC's Manufacturing, Construction & Transportation (MCT) pathway based at the college's Oak Creek Campus and eligible for an All Within My Hands (AWMH) scholarship.

AWMH is a workforce initiative established by Metallica in 2017 and designed to help prospective students, recent

high school graduates and adults discover and explore hands-on careers in "heavy metal" fields, including automotive/diesel technology, truck driving, computerized manufacturing, HVAC and welding.

In July 2022, MATC was selected from a competitive field of community colleges across the country to receive \$100,000 from AWMH.

"The mission of Metallica's All Within My Hands aligns perfectly with our mission, which is to offer an education that transforms lives, industry and community," MATC President Dr. Vicki J. Martin said in 2022. "This funding will help students enroll in our high-quality, in-demand programs that meet local employer and community needs – leading to careers that provide family-supporting wages and better lives."

In October 2023, nearly 150 high school students gathered at MATC's Oak Creek Campus to explore and experience the college's manufacturing, construction and transportation programs such as welding, building automated systems, tool and die making, diesel and powertrain servicing, and automotive maintenance.

Students from South Milwaukee, Oak Creek, Franklin, Cudahy, Whitnall, Greendale and St. Francis high schools participated in the event, dubbed the "Heavy Metal Tour" and sponsored in part by AWMH.

The goal of the event was to expose students to the opportunities in manufacturing and perhaps change their perception of those careers, says Patricia Torres Nájera, Ph.D., regional director of MATC's Oak Creek Campus.

The students toured classrooms, workspaces and labs dedicated to welding, truck driving, tool and die making, and auto repair.

"I think it's important to give students a full menu of what careers are ahead of them and give them a real taste of the actual workforce," says State Sen. Chris Larson, who represents Milwaukee, Oak Creek, Cudahy, St. Francis, South Milwaukee, and Franklin, and who attended the event. Also at the event were State Rep. Jessie Rodriguez, who represents southeastern Milwaukee County and Oak Creek Mayor Daniel Bukiewicz.

"This is great for the kids," says Tom Backes, a technical education and youth apprenticeship instructor at Cudahy High School and a former MATC instructor. "We have about 750 students at Cudahy, and our tech ed classes serve about two-thirds of them. Programs like this are important for spreading the word about technical education."

Briseno, who started classes at MATC in January 2023, applied for and received a Metallica scholarship for the fall 2023 semester. She lived at home with her father and two dogs while attending classes full time and working part time at Jet Repair Services in Milwaukee, which repairs and maintains trucks, trailers and all sorts of heavy equipment.

"The Metallica scholarship helped us tremendously," Briseno says. "By using that money to pay for school, we were able to save money to pay for food, rent and other basic needs. It really lifted the burden of how I will pay for school."

At school, Briseno was one of the few women in her Diesel and Powertrain Servicing classes. "Most everyone was pretty cool about it," she says. "In working with these kinds of vehicles, there is some heavy lifting involved. There are still some components and parts that I can't lift, but I'm working on it."

"Crystal was here every day and on time," reports Craig Kuehl, a Diesel and Powertrain Servicing program instructor. "She came to us already employed in the field and is still with the same employer. Crystal has a positive attitude, and it was a pleasure to have her in class."

"Despite the challenges of balancing work and school, she has managed to excel in her studies, showcasing an admirable ability to juggle multiple responsibilities," says Erik Riley, Briseno's advisor in MATC's MCT Pathway. "Her commitment to achieving academic success while simultaneously fulfilling work obligations reflects not only her time-management skills, but also her dedication to personal and professional growth."

Today, Briseno is working as a full-fledged mechanic at Jet. She plans to save some money, maybe travel and then decide what to do next.

"I'm going to go with the flow and see where that takes me," she says. "But the skills I have learned at MATC means that I will always have a safety net. I can take my skills wherever I go. Maybe someday I will want to work on even bigger equipment like construction vehicles or trains. You never know."

FULL CIRCLE: A Journey From Intern to Finance Director

In January 2014, Stephanie Hall (then Stephanie Kirby) was a student at Wisconsin Lutheran College when she received an email about an internship opportunity assisting the Finance Department at the Village of Greendale.

"It sounded like a great learning experience, so I applied, interviewed and was fortunate to be hired," Hall remembers. The internship involved processing payments at the front counter and answering the phone. She also learned to reconcile bank statements, balance the drawers and other tasks assisting the clerk/treasurer.

A few months prior to graduating, the deputy treasurer position opened up at Village Hall and Stephanie was promoted to the position. During her time as deputy treasurer, it became Stephanie's goal to eventually be a municipal finance director.

In May 2019, Stephanie accepted a new opportunity with Waukesha County's budget office and she was later promoted to principal financial analyst.

The retirement of Greendale's finance director, Kristen Victory, in February 2023 opened the door for Hall's return to Greendale. "I always enjoyed working for the Village of Greendale, so when the position was available,

I recognized it as not just a great career opportunity, but also a role I knew I would enjoy," Hall says.

Village Manager Mike Hawes says he was glad when Stephanie applied for the position because she had left a positive impression with the staff that she worked with when she was previously in Greendale. Coincidentally, Hawes also tried recruiting her to fill a Village treasurer opening when he was the administrator for the Village of Union Grove. "I could tell she had a great attitude and was very professional," Hawes recalls.

In Hall's role as finance director/treasurer, she is responsible for oversight of all aspects of the financial administration of the Village, including accounts payable and receivable, investment of Village funds, accounting, utility billing, development of financial internal controls and all financial reporting and budgeting, grant and TIF accounting, and tax collection and settlement.

Hall says she enjoys the variety of tasks that come with the job, but that can also bring challenges. "There are certain times of the year when there are multiple tasks that need to get done on the same deadline, making effective time management a significant struggle," she explains.

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

New AV Equipment for Village Boardroom Enhances Capabilities

The original audio-visual equipment that was purchased for the Village boardroom was installed in 2009. In 2023, the system began failing and the microphones were no longer able to be adjusted. They eventually failed completely, and a solution was needed.

The anticipated useful life of A/V equipment is 7-10 years – and the Village was luckily able to use the same system for almost 15 years. However, as with all good things that come to an end, the Village Board recognized it was time to address the deteriorating situation. They decided to move forward with the installation of a new system, rather than investing funds in repairs to the current system, which was already out-of-date.

The previous setup faced issues such as poor audio quality, limited visual clarity, and difficulty in accommodating remote participation. So the Village Board undertook a significant initiative to enhance the audio-visual capabilities of the boardroom. The new equipment includes microphones that amplify within the boardroom, and in the vestibule, for instances where there is a large attendance for a meeting. Televisions were installed on the front and back walls, along with one in the lobby to allow Board members and the public to view packet items and see remote participants or presentations. The previous system did not easily allow remote participants, but the new system allows a seamless connection with remote participants, which may include Board members, staff, consultants or developers. The new system will also provide for a better experience for those who watch the Village Board meetings via the Village's YouTube channel.

This new system was used for the first time at the February 6 board meeting. A few adjustments were made after testing out the system for the first meeting, and it is anticipated that there will be an even better experience moving forward.

For those of you who are unaware, the Village streams all of the regular Village Board meetings live on the Village of Greendale's YouTube Channel. The Village Board meets on the first and third Tuesdays of every month at 6 p.m. at Village Hall. All previous meetings may also be viewed on the YouTube channel: Village of Greendale - YouTube (under the "LIVE" section).

To stay connected to what issues the Village Board is currently working on, make sure to subscribe to the biweekly e-mail update. The Friday prior to a Board meeting a Village Hall e-mail update is sent out, that includes a summary of actions the Board is looking to take at the following Tuesday Board meeting, a summary of what actions were approved at the previous meeting, and any other important information or upcoming events. If you do not have time to watch all the Board meetings it is a fast and easy way to stay connected to what is going on in your community.

The e-mail update also includes a link to the full Village Board meeting packet where you can find more detailed information on any of the items the Board will be discussing at its upcoming meeting. Agenda packet materials for all regular Board meetings have been available online since 2023.

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



Of course, the usual homework materials are here, but so are electronic study resources unavailable at school like live online tutoring. And when school is closed where do kids get their mental recreation fix and connect with their friends in a safe space? At the Greendale Library, of course!

Library Director Brian Van Klooster explains that the Library has become an important government partner in its work with the Health Department and Park and Recreation Department. Not only do these three agencies share the Community Learning Center location, they also cooperate on shared programs and resources to help deliver excellent services in a cost-effective, convenient way. Van Klooster says, "We support affordable recreation opportunities by working with individual donors and the Friends of the Greendale Library to obtain discounted or free admission to area cultural attractions, like museums and nature parks. Plus, the Library is even a partner in elections by hosting candidate forums for School and Village political races."

The Greendale Library hasn't always been this way. Julie Schumacher, a Library employee for 20 years, has this to say about how things have changed: "I've seen how much effort has been made in recent years to connect with every part of the community. Our programs used to focus mostly on youth, but now there's something for everyone. Our service variety now spans a broad range of ages and interests."

Don't worry. Books and reading have always been, and will always be, a crucial part of the Library's work. The resources have just become more diverse! You can find world language collections that include Arabic and Spanish, e-magazines to browse on a tablet or smartphone, local newspaper articles from 100 years ago that you can read in the comfort of your home, STEM kits for expanded learning after school, audio-books to stream from your phone or car radio, the loan of unique books from collections outside the state, and so much more.

Business Spotlight: National Bakery & Deli SCRATCH BAKERY GOODNESS FOR ALMOST 100 YEARS!

Nhen a line of eagerly awaiting customers routinely forms inside (and sometimes stretching outside) a popular local bakery, you already know that there is something mouth-watering and delicious waiting for you.

Such is the case with National Bakery & Deli, a 99-year-old establishment in Milwaukee with three locations, including one in Greendale. On any given day (Mon. through Sat.), you will find the place bustling with activity as the staff answers the phone to take custom requests, slices up the baked ham for those popular 1-lb. orders that include six free rolls, and works the counter boxing up the Bakery's delicious cookies, pastries, donuts, muffins, pies and tarts. And those lines can form at any time, comprised of loyal customers who don't mind waiting for their favorite treats.

There are also the times of special events and holidays (read more about them below), when, as one customer marvels, "You can always tell the months, or at least the seasons, when shopping at National Bakery, merely by checking out the glass display cases lined with decorated cookies that celebrate various sports, spring and other seasons, Easter and other holidays, back-to-school, and Christmas.

National Bakery and Deli has stood the test of time for an amazing nine+ decades. The business was founded in 1925 in an old Polish neighborhood in Milwaukee. Since then, the

Bakery has flourished and has been added onto and expanded several times. A second location opened in New Berlin in 1991, yet it quickly outgrew its location and was relocated to its current address on the corner of Greenfield and Sunnyslope in Brookfield. In 2009, National Bakery opened its third location, right here on Broad Street in Greendale. So what are some of the most popular bakery items at National Bakery & Deli? First and foremost are their stellar bakery items: cakes, cookies, coffee cakes, donuts, breads and rolls. Plus, wedding and birthday cakes, and wedding shower cupcakes, along with decorated cookies are in great demand. However, the Bakery offers so much more. For example, the Badger ham and rolls, a true Milwaukee tradition and not just on Sundays, but SIX DAYS a week at National Bakery, always take center stage with their secret spices baked right in (don't forget the six free rolls!). And there are other

lunchmeats sold by the pound, along with a variety of salads.

What are YOUR favorite paczki flavors? Krauss says, "Although prune seems to get the most attention, our raspberry-glazed and sugar are our most popular. A paczki-eating contest has always been on the horizon, but we have never actually organized one – yet!"

"The local shops and Farmers Market help bring additional people into the store here," says Callen, "and Greendale has some of the most loyal and kindest customers around!" The owners end by emphasizing, "This is certainly a fun and rewarding road to travel!"



*W*hat is the Greendale Historical Society? It's all about our history and its intrinsic relationship to Greendale today . . . and tomorrow. And it's about my chance to use words like "intrinsic."

IT'S A BIG IDEA. Except in comics, where ideas show up as light bulbs, they are difficult to actually see. Wind is like that, too. You cannot see wind, but you can see the effect it has on leaves – and your hair. Your hair, not mine, thanks to a crisp, wind-resistant #1 buzz cut.

The Greendale Historical Society's Mission – A Big Idea: "To Preserve the Past for the Future"


While that certainly answers the "why does the Greendale Historical Society exist" question, is it visible? Absolutely. There are plenty of ways to see that idea. Well, to see the effects of that Big Idea. Here are a few:

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Greendale Historical Society (which I am going to shorten to "Society") visits our schools, local organizations, and retirement communities with a variety of highly engaging programs. My favorite Society production? "Our Town: Greendale, Wisconsin" featuring actors in period costumes sharing first-person accounts of Greendale pioneers. And, looking to the future, the Society's annual scholarship awarded to a Greendale graduate helps our future leaders start their education.

NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK STATUS

The Society led the successful campaign to have the Greendale Historic District first listed on the National Register of Historic Places. That honor led to the designation in 2012 as a National Historic Landmark by the U.S. Department of Interior. Cool? Yes, very!



THE HISTORIC WELCOME CENTER 5680 BROAD ST.

It's part museum, part gift shop – but mostly, it's a warm, welcoming "front door" to Greendale, Wis. Located in the heart of our downtown, residents and visitors alike can learn the story of the Village, what we have to offer all who visit, and why Greendale is a National Historic Landmark.

HISTORIC HOSE TOWER COMMUNITY CENTER

In 2009, the Society funded a formal Adaptive Reuse Study to preserve and repurpose the original Hose Tower and Grounds Building – a tired, little-used building with a unique, 47-foot tower. By 2015, thanks to a partnership of the Society, the Village of Greendale, and the entire community, Greendale had itself a historic, yet modern community gathering place for special events and larger groups.

This "original" was the second one built in Greendale. The house retained most of its original features (clay tile roof, hardwood floors, kitchen sink) and just needed a little (okay, a lot!) of TLC. The Society (thank you, donors!) bought the house in 2019 and gave it tons of love, sweat ... and, among other things, modern plumbing. The house is now available for tours, events and overnight guests through AIRBNB and VRBO. It's a fascinating stay to live – even if only for a few days or a weekend – like one of the very first pioneers who moved into the Village. Ah, if those walls could only talk, the stories they would tell!

DIAMOND T FIRE ENGINE

Greendale's first new fire engine has a colorful history. Visit the Historical Society website and see for yourself: greendalehistoricalsociety.org/1938-diamond-t-firetruck. The fact that this 1938 fire engine is back home, restored and roaming the streets (during summer weekends, holidays and Village celebrations) is the result of a determined and

fired-up (pun intended) Society. The Society, the Village of Greendale and the Greendale Fire Department all contribute to its ongoing preservation/care, and recognize the Diamond T's importance to our history. (See the ad on pg. 41 for how you can share in the fun of the Diamond T.)

YOU WANT MORE? I got more, my friend. The Society led the preservation efforts of the Alonzo Hauser (flagpole at the Greendale Middle School) partnering with the School District and the Russ and Emmons families. Plus, the Society was a loud voice in saving the original Police and Fire Station from demolition. The Society is also the talk – and the walk – in the Walking Tours of Historic Greendale.

In addition, the Society is digitizing Greendale's historical documents and photographs, making them searchable and accessible. For example, every Greendale High School yearbook from 1949 is now available – in a searchable format.

There is even more, but it is seductive not to reveal everything. That, and these articles, are assigned word limits. Do yourself (and us) a favor and stop in the Welcome Center next time you are cruising Broad Street. Check out the replica of an "original" kitchen, use our restrooms (optional) and say "hi" to the friendly volunteer welcoming you. Grab yourself a brochure or two about our local businesses, and enjoy the fact that history is alive and well here in our "Garden Community," a treasured National Historic Landmark.
